Household Waste Recycling to Increase from 10% to 60%

South Dublin householders currently produce 90,000 tonnes of waste annually with more than 80,000 tonnes going into landfill. As part of a major plan to improve environmental services in the county, South Dublin County Council aims to increase recycling of household waste from 10% to 60%.

Under the plan all 75,000 households in the South Dublin County Council area are to receive three wheeled bins which will enable users to segregate waste for recycling. To fund this enhanced service, the Council has introduced an annual waste charge of G190. The County Manager, Mr. Joe Horan said the move is in line with that already taken by other local authorities in Dublin, and across the country, to adopt the EU 'polluter pays' policy to waste management and increase the level of recycling.

"It is unsustainable to continue putting the current level of waste into landfill. This is a very worthwhile investment to protect the many outstanding outdoor amenities in South Dublin County and sustain a healthy future for the environment," he said. All households have received the first of the three wheeled bins, a grey bin for general household waste. Distribution of the second, a green bin for household cans, cardboard and paper has commenced: 50,000 households will have these bins by the end of 2002 and the remainder will receive them early in 2003. The third is a brown bin for domestic food and garden waste and the first of these will be introduced in 2003.

Further Enhancements to Waste Services

In addition to the initiatives to dramatically increase recycling of household waste there are further enhancements to waste services that South Dublin County Council is currently introducing. These include:

- A major Anti Litter Education and Enforcement Campaign.
- Establishment of 12 new Bring Centres for recyclables e.g. cans, textiles and plastics bringing the total number to 40.
- · Introduction of two new street cleaning 'green machines' to service the Palmerstown/Lucan and Rathfarnham/Templeogue areas, complementing the two existing machines at Tallaght and Clondalkin.
- Provision of an additional 300 home composters for the recycling of garden and kitchen waste, bringing the total number to 1,300.
- Appointment of two extra Litter Wardens, increasing the number of Wardens from four to six.
- Provision of 50 extra litter bins across the County bringing the total to 550.
