## Special Olympics Ireland celebrate 30 Years **Changing Lives**

VERY special event took place on Sunday the 28th of A September 2008 in Clondalkin Leisure Centre, hosted by Mayor Marie Corr and South Dublin County Council celebrating the 30th Anniversary of Special Olympics in Ireland.

Special Olympics Ireland commemorated and thanked all communities for their support during the last three decades under the theme 30 Years Changing Lives. Across Ireland, local government, religious groups, schools, sports organisations and other local agencies partook in this very special occasion by hosting events in their local community making the day as participatory and inclusive as possible for everyone in the locality.

Since its inception in 1978 the Special Olympics Ireland has played a very important role in the lives of so many families involved in the programme. Among the many achievements of the organisation the transformative power of Special Olympics as the single most powerful vehicle for changing attitudes and promoting acceptance for those with an intellectual disability is one of their greatest.

Joining the staff and representatives of South Dublin County Council to celebrate this special milestone was Mr George Hook, and most importantly representatives of 19 Special Olympic clubs in the county, their leaders and the many volunteers from around South Dublin County.

The opening ceremony comprised of the lighting of the Olympic flame followed by a fantastic gymnastics display performed by South Dublin Sports Club. Other activities included bouncy castles, face painters, live performance by Superfly and an assortment of fun and games for all.

Special Olympics Ireland is an organisation with 11,000 athletes participating in 12 sports in 409 clubs supported by 18,000 volunteers across the island of Ireland, week in week out. This makes Special Olympics Ireland one of Ireland's largest community and voluntary organisations and reaches 33% of the 34,000 people with intellectual disabilities in Ireland. In addition to providing sports training and competition, Special Olympics Ireland also incorporates the Athlete Leadership Programme (ALPs), the Family Support Programme, Healthy Athlete and Volunteer Programme to name but a few.

A spokesperson for Special Olympics Ireland said South Dublin County Council's contribution to the success of Special Olympics has never gone unnoticed. For 30 years Special Olympics Irelands aim has been to provide more sports opportunities for people with a learning disability in their own communities. This has been largely achieved thanks to the dedication and support of the communities, volunteers, coaches and partners nationwide.

Under the Special Olympics Ireland Strategy 2008-2011, the organisation aims to grow the participation at local level and ensure that quality programmes are available in every community to all athletes, as well as potential athletes, volunteers, coaches and families. By 2011 Special Olympics Ireland will have engaged with more people with a learning disability so that they have the opportunity to play a full role in their own community.

## The Higher Education Grants Scheme


South Dublin County Council operates a scheme of Higher Education Grants (on behalf of the Department of Education & Science) in respect of approved full time third level education courses at both postgraduate and undergraduate levels.

Grants are available for approved courses at universities and certain other educational institutions within Ireland and other EU countries. South Dublin County Council deals with degree and post-graduate courses while the VEC deals with Certificate (cert), Post Leaving Certificate (PLC) & Diploma Courses. Courses in private colleges and part-time courses are not covered under the terms of the Department of Education Higher Education

The Higher Education Grants Scheme is generally issued by the Department of Education & Science in mid June / early July each year and is formally "approved" by the Council at the next possible Council meeting. Once the Scheme has been approved advertisements are placed in the local press inviting applications.

Generally speaking the grant scheme applies to students who:

- are entering approved courses for the first time, are eligible for grants where they satisfy the relevant conditions as to means, age, academia, residence, and nationality.
- are a mature student, who in the academic year in question is either entering in order to complete an approved course at undergraduate level for the first time or reentering in order to pursue or complete an approved course at postgraduate level for the first time or already hold a postgraduate qualification and are re-entering to progress to a further postgraduate course which represents progression. (In order to be considered a mature student, you need to be at least 23 years of age on January 1 of the year you enter your chosen course).
- Have attended but not successfully completed an approved course and are returning following a break of at least 5 years in order to pursue an approved course at the same level in the academic year in question. In this instance, you will be considered a Second Chance Student



**Means:** Grants are awarded in accordance with the means test set out in the Scheme, that is, your income must be below a certain level. This is referred to as "reckonable income" in the Scheme.

**Age:** Students must be at least 17 years of age on January 1 of the year following application, except in the case of a "mature student".

**Residence:** Students, parents or guardians or you yourself if you are an independent mature candidate, must have been ordinarily resident in the South Dublin Area on 1st October of the year prior to entry to course.

Nationality: Students must hold E.U. Nationality; or have Official Refugee Status; or have been granted Humanitarian Leave to Remain in the State (prior to the Immigration Act 1999); or be a person in respect of whom the Minister for Justice, Equality and Law Reform has granted permission to remain following a determination not to make a deportation order; or have permission to remain in the State by virtue of marriage to an Irish national residing in the State, or be the child of such person, not having EU nationality; or have permission to remain in the State by virtue of marriage to a national of another EU Member State who is residing in the State and who is or has been employed, or self-employed, in the State, or be the child of such a person, not having EU nationality; or be nationals of a member country of the European Economic Area (EEA) or Switzerland.

Value of Grant: The amount of grant awarded can vary from fees only to full fees and full maintenance. The value of the grants for fees (including Registration Fee) and maintenance are set down annually by the Department of Education and Science. The rates of grants payable under the current scheme are as follows:



There are also special rates of maintenance grants payable for disadvantaged students.

Grants are paid in three installments to coincide with academic terms generally in October, January and at Easter.

## Oidhreacht — Our Heritage

#### 9th Annual Photographic Competition & Exhibition 2008

AYOR Marie Corr opened the annual Oidhreacht Heritage Photographic competition at County Library Tallaght on the 21st October. The competition is now in its 9th year and each year has seen it grow and continue to succeed and flourish. Over these nine years the library has collected a rich array of photographs depicting the life, lore and heritage of the County, thanks to all the people who took the time and effort to capture an image and enter it into the competition.



This year was a little different as all submissions were digital. This we hoped would encourage more people, especially those who may not have thought about entering a photo competition before, to enter. We received over 240 photos – the biggest entry ever in the history of the competition. We also wanted to take advantage of the latest technologies available here in the County Library so that the photos could reach more people. ## ARE YOU REGISTERED TO VOTE ?

In order to be able to vote a person's name must be entered on the **Register of Electors** (Register) for the area in which they ordinarily reside. South Dublin County Council is required to prepare and publish a Register every year. It comes into force on 15th February and is used for all subsequent elections and referendum held within the following 12 months.

Before a person can be included on the Register they must satisfy certain criteria relating to age, residence and citizenship.

Age: A person must be at least 18 years of age on the day the Register comes into force (15th February). All residents of the state aged 18 and upwards are entitled to be on the Register.

Residence: A person must be ordinarily resident at the address they wish to be registered on 1st September preceding the coming into force of the register. A person can only be registered at one address.

<u>Citizenship:</u> A person's citizenship determines the type of election at which they are entitled to vote. The law relating to citizenship is governed by the Irish Nationality & Citizen Acts 1956-2004 for which the Department of Justice Equality & Law Reform is responsible. The right to vote is as follows:

**Irish Citizens** may vote at every election and referendum.

**British Citizens** may vote at Dáil, European and Local elections. (D)

**Other EU Citizens** may vote in European and Local elections. (E)

Non-EU Citizens may vote at Local Elections only. (L)

During the course of each year South Dublin County Council engages a team of Inspectors to carry out house-to-house enquiries for the purpose of preparing the Draft Register. This involves delivering registration forms (RFA) to each household, as well as collecting information from residents on their doorsteps. The Draft Register is published on 1st November and is made available to the public for inspection at local Post Offices, Libraries, Garda Stations and the Council's Civic Offices. It is also available to check on line on www.southdublin.ie and www.checktheregister.ie. Errors or omissions discovered / identified between the period 1st November to 25th November are notified to the Council so that they may be corrected. The Live Register is published on 1st February and comes into effect on 15th February.

Anyone who misses the November deadline may apply to go on the **Supplement to the Register**, which is always published prior to an election / referendum. An application (RFA2) for entry on the supplement must be witnessed by a member of the Garda Siochana and must be received by the Council at least 15 working days before polling day to be considered for that election.

Anyone already on the register but having moved residence from one constituency to another or to another local electoral area can apply for entry to the supplement at the new address by completing a Change of Address form (RFA3). This application must be signed and stamped at a Garda station.

There are certain categories of individuals who are permitted to vote by post. These are called Postal Voters and include:

- Full-time members of the Defence Forces who normally live in military barracks.
- ▶ Irish Diplomats posted abroad and their spouses.
- Members of the Garda Siochána
- Persons unable to go to a polling station due to a physical illness or disability.
- Persons whose occupations are likely to prevent them from attending a polling station on election day, including full-time students registered at home but attending college elsewhere in the state.
- Persons unable to vote at their polling station due to circumstances of their detention in a prison pursuant to an order of a court

Special Voters, persons with a physical illness or disability living in hospitals, nursing homes or similar institutions may be entitled to vote at these locations. The illness or disability must prevent them from attending the polling station in person. On polling day a special Presiding Officer accompanied by a Garda delivers a ballot paper to the individual.

Copies of the register are made available to elected public representatives and election candidates. However, it is an offence to use details on the full register for anything other than electoral or other statutory purpose.

An Edited Register of Electors is also prepared and published. This register contains the names and addresses of persons who have indicated that they wish their details to be made available for a purpose other than electoral or statutory eg direct marketing use by a commercial or other organisation.

RED overlooks the Tallaght Luas stop and is a key element of South Dublin County Council's strategy for the development of the arts across South Dublin County and is committed to providing a diverse, high quality and innovative arts programme. Combined under one roof, this multiple purpose arts resource aims to connect and communicate with you, our audience by being a unique driver for wide public access to the arts. This means providing excellent productions, facilities and activities for everyone. Through time we hope to play a significant role within the cultural life of South Dublin and grow as a vibrant creative hub for Ireland and beyond by attracting national and international artists to perform and exhibit at the centre.

**RED** consists of two galleries (including a 'white cube') and a 60 seat performance space. Quarryvale Community and Leisure Centre while young painters are celebrating their communities producing murals and artwork with artist John Carpenter.



The Marker Tree by artist Andreas Kopp, is a major new public artwork commissioned through In Context 3, South **Dublin County Council's Per** Cent for Art Scheme 2006-2009.

The design of The Marker Tree combines the natural form of a tree with shapes and surfaces associated with industrial process and production. The sculpture has a steel trunk and branches, with brightly coloured steel 'cushions' in place of leaf clusters. The colours of the leaf 'cushions' came from the fluorescent marker pens used by the artist in his original drawings: red, yellow, pink, green and blue. The Marker Tree will change appearance from day to night, as the playful colours seen in daytime give way to soft lights scattered throughout the tree at night.

As a commonly shared signpost this sculpture will mark the daily journeys of commuters and residents, becoming a landmark with personal associations and memories for each person who passes. As artist Andreas Kopp says:

"The Marker Tree will not just be a modern, smart looking piece of contemporary art, a landmark for South Dublin, but can be used by passers by as a place to project wishes, intentions or just to-do-lists. The sculpture can be seen in many different ways, as something natural or industrial, as a landmark or a lighthouse, playful or serious. It is open to interpretation for all who pass by. '

Work plans, designed to implement a series of actions to meet the objectives have been developed and work has just begun on implementation.







## South Dublin County Council launches Ireland's first underground glass bring bank at Sean Walsh Park, Tallaght

Underground bring banks are a common feature in European cities and South Dublin County Council is proud to be the first local authority in Ireland to install an assessable to all underground bring bank. The opening on the newly installed Equinord underground bring bank is lower than the standard bring bank and therefore accessible to wheelchair users. These new underground bring banks look similar to a litter bin, however when glass is placed in the chute it drops into a bin below ground.

South Dublin County Council has 58 locations throughout the County with recycling facilities. Materials that can be recycled vary from location to location and include glass, cans, plastic and textiles. It was funded by South Dublin County Council and the National Disability Strategy Fund and was installed by Heiton Buckley.



Comhairli na nÓg are local youth councils, which give children and young people the opportunity to be involved in the development of local services and policies. It provides the youth of South Dublin County with an opportunity to identify and discuss matters which affect their daily lives, and provides a forum for young people to pass on their views and concerns to decision-makers in both local and national government. This year was a busy year for South Dublin Comhairle na nÓg, as we saw eight of its members representing South Dublin County Council at Dáil na nÓg in February. Delegates from Comhairle na nÓg are elected to represent their local area at the annual Dáil na nÓg (National Youth Parliament) which is organised by the National Youth Council of Ireland and funded by the Office of the Minister for Children. This event had substantial media coverage and some of our members were interviewed on the Pat Kenny Radio Show, NewsTalk 106, and also appeared on Ireland AM. Gemma Harding, Vice-Chairperson of Comhairle na nÓg was elected to the Dáil na nÓg Youth Council, which will progress the recommendations made by young people in attendance.

The Comhairle na nÓg Student Council Network website. http://www.studentcouncilnetwork.ie/ was developed to allow student councils within the

county to keep in touch with each other and to communicate the various issues arising within their school councils. With the support of Connect http://connect.southdublin.ie/cnanog/ student Councils across South Dublin County have been given the opportunity to develop and build their 2008 website. In March Connections' - a workshop between Comhairle na nÓg, the County Development Board and the Children's Services Committee took place. The workshop had two objectives: to open dialogue between the three groups and to begin the consultation process around developing a County Recreation Strategy for Young People. This is just one of the key projects currently undertaken by the Comhairle.

We now look forward to the election of the new Comhairle which is due to take place in January 2009. Comhairle na nÓg will continue to work closely with Youth Services, Barnardos and The Irish Wheelchair Association to encourage all youth in the county to become involved and identify issues affecting their daily lives.

#### AN END TO LITTER BLACKSPOTS FOR TALLAGHT

South Dublin County Council welcomes the County's improve-ments in the current IBAL survey rating based on surveys carried out in August of this year. The Council views the improved results, and particularly the comments provided, as a positive reflection of all the work it has



continued to carry out since the beginning of 2008. In January of this year the Council identified a plan of action to address the issue of litter in the County. These actions saw the re-organisation and deployment of additional Cleansing staff, increased focus on awareness and enforcement and the preparation of the Litter Management Plan for adoption by the Members of the County Council.

The Council remains focused on achieving a litter free status in the County and will continue to work on the strong foundations established at the beginning of this year. With this in mind the Council requested An Taisce, who conduct the IBAL surveys, to carry out a baseline litter survey of the County. This baseline survey is more widespread and comprehensive than the IBAL surveys

and, having been carried out more recently, gives a better indication of the status of areas throughout the county at the present time.

Over 200 sites were surveyed during early October, the complete results of which will be released in the coming weeks. Initial feedback from the County wide baseline survey indicates that the results of the actions implemented by the Council since the beginning of the year, when assessed against the IBAL criteria, achieved a score of 78% or "slightly litter" – a further improvement on the IBAL results.

The Council continuously works to combat litter in the County providing the community with several anti-litter incentive and environmental awareness programmes. Since the beginning of 2008, over 2,300 litter fines have been handed out in the County and 177 notices under the Litter Pollution Act have been issued.

"The Council is pleased that our efforts are starting to show through in the results of these surveys", said John Quinlivan, Senior Executive Officer with the Council's Environment Department. "Our aim is to achieve litter free status for the county and we feel that we are well on the way to that position".

## Place names and Street names Directory for South Dublin


The Mayor of South Dublin County Council, Marie Corr launched the South Dublin Placenames and Streetnames Directory on the 26th September. The directory is a comprehensive listing of all placenames, streetnames, schools, apartments, industrial estates, shopping centres and parks, in English and Irish.

The publishing of this directory has been greatly anticipated as it is hoped to be a useful source for people living and working in the County to use with confidence the place names provided in the Irish Language. The Irish Language is a clear link to the county's history and heritage which the directory aims to preserve.

Speaking at the launch the Mayor Marie Corr said "The directory is part of an overall scheme by the Council which was developed under section 11 of the Official Languages Act 2003. A series of initiatives are underway by the council with the aim of promoting Irish and bringing uniformity across the county, for example the replacement of incorrect road signs"

The directory will be sent out to all schools and post offices in the South Dublin County Council area. It will also be available on request from the libraries, the Irish Office and on our website www.sdcc.ie

## "PAY AS YOU GO" AT THE END OF THE YEAR



South Dublin County Council is preparing to make life easier for its refuse collection customers by introducing a new "Pay as you Go" type bin collection system. Every customer will soon have their own refuse collection account. The customer's bin will be directly linked to this account. The benefits of this new system include:

- no more running to the shops for tags at the last minute
- no more possibility of lost or stolen tags.

#### How does it work?

Customers will be issued with a card and a PIN that will allow them to place credit in shops, over the internet or over the phone. When an account has enough credit for a collection, our refuse truck will automatically lift the bin. This will be possible through the use of new technology: the truck will "read" the microchip on the customer's bin.

## Will the refuse collection system change?

Very little will change to the service provided to you apart from removing the need to purchase bin tags. The first phase of this new process is well underway and involves linking bins to customer addresses.

#### What's next?

The next phase involves providing selected retail outlets with a credit sale devise which, in turn, will be linked to our new system. Customers will be notified of the shops where bin credit can be purchased. Each customer will be set up with an individual refuse collection account and will be supplied with an account card and account ID. These details can be used to purchase bin credit online, over the phone from the Council, via mobile phone or from the selected

retailers. In addition, customers will be able to check their account credit status and waste collection information online. It is planned that customers will be able to start buying their credit in time for the introduction of the new system at the beginning of next year. In the meantime, people must continue to buy a tag to get the bin collection.

## But I have a waiver — How does it affect me?

Waiver customers will not be affected by this changeover as their accounts will be credited to allow the same number of bin lifts as previously

### Homes in South Dublin County to benefit from Community Smoke Alarm Scheme



The Department of Environment, Heritage and Local Government, have sanctioned funding for the installation of smoke alarms in vulnerable households in South Dublin County. The Minister said, "We must always be looking at ways to help the most vulnerable in our society. Smoke alarms can save lives. "One life lost from fire is one too many."

Under the scheme, local authorities will, identify private households where older persons reside. Where there are no smoke alarms, the Council will arrange for the supply and installation of two ten year self contained smoke alarms. This scheme is limited to 250 households in South Dublin County and alarms will be installed on a first come first served basis.

Currently 20% of Irish households have no working smoke alarm and the objective of the Community Smoke Alarm Scheme, which was developed in consultation with officials from the local authorities, is to target vulnerable households.

# CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE BURGLARY

#### Walk in burglary

No one will go to the trouble of breaking into your house if they can simply walk in. Therefore whenever your house is vacant always ensure that you lock your doors irrespective of how short the period of time the house is vacant. In this context be careful if you are gardening.

The same advice applies in relation to your windows. Whenever you leave your house always ensure that your windows are closed every time.

#### **Distraction Burglary**

This type of crime occurs on doorsteps. It normally includes some kind of deception. Typical victims are over 65s and people living alone. Often involves bogus workmen (roofers or tarmac contractors) or bogus charity collectors or bogus requests (can the child go to the toilet / have a glass of water; or my dog / football has gone in to your back garden). The over riding objective of all this is to gain admittance to your house in order to take something.

The best way to ensure that you are not a victim is under no circumstances to let them in. The best way to achieve this is to fit a door chain and viewer or better still an audio/visual intercom especially if you are over 65 and living alone.

#### Other burglary issues

If you don't have a house alarm fit one. If you do have an alarm switch it on every time you leave the house and also every night when you go to bed. It is also important to appoint a keyholder (ideally one within the locality) if you have an alarm fitted.

Do not leave car keys on view when you go to bed at night and do not leave cash in the house.

#### **Look out for Elderly Neighbours**

#### Theft from unattended cars

Do not leave valuables exposed on view in unattended cars. Most thieves will only break in to cars if they actually see property exposed within. Typically this advice would cover laptops, mobile phones, MP3, players, mobile games consuls and power tools.

## 623 Homes benefit from energy saving programme

SOUTH Dublin County Council has now successfully completed its Pilot Window Programme. A total of 623 Council homes have benefited from this energy saving programme.

Other energy efficiency measures carried out in Council homes by South Dublin County Council include: cavity wall and attic insulation, efficient central heating with thermostatically controlled radiators, regular boiler service, and efficient lagging jacket on hot water cylinder. In addition, in order to improve fire safety in the home, mains smoke alarms are being installed.

As part of the Council's ongoing commitment to Customer Care and in line with the Council's Corporate Plan's theme for a "Customer Focused Organisation", Housing Projects Section compiled a customer satisfaction survey in order to establish levels of satisfaction with the new windows/doors and to ascertain what were the main benefits which tenants felt the new windows/doors had given them.

The questionnaire sought information on levels of satisfaction with the windows/doors and also asked the resident to outline what, if any, were the main benefits of the new windows/doors? The success of the Pilot Window/Door upgrade programme has been overwhelming based upon all the positive comments/ responses received in respect of the postal survey. 190 survey questionnaires were returned from 623 sent, representing 30% return. As an incentive to encourage maximum participation in the survey it was decided to offer €300 value of vouchers to spend in a Woodies DIY store on home improvements for the lucky winner.

**Summary:** 92% representing 164 replies were satisfied with the installation process.

A Terenure National school is aiming to improve pupil fitness and cut traffic congestion at the school gates by starting its first Walking Bus.

St. Pius X National School on Fortfield Park started its Walking Bus from the Church car park on College Drive, along College Park, Fortfield Avenue, and Fortfield Park on 16th September 2008 to coincide with the commencement of European Mobility Week. The Bus will run each morning at 8.30 am under the guidance of volunteer adult supervisors from the Parents Association and will take the same route every day.

The Walking Bus concept offers an alternative to the car for the school journey and it represents a sustainable mode of transport. As well as reducing traffic and congestion at the school gates there are many health, educational, and environmental benefits to the scheme; it provides opportunities to get exercise and fresh air at the start of the school day; opportunities for children to learn essential road safety skills that will be of benefit in later years when they become more independent; and of course it's environmentally friendly producing no air or noise pollution.

### GINGER BREAD CHRISTMAS COOKIES RECIPE

- 1 1/4 cups of sugar
- 2/3 cup light molasses or corn syrup
- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 2/3 cup heavy cream

- 1 3/4 tbsp. ground ginger
- 1 tbsp. baking soda
- 6 cups flour



Heat the sugar, molasses, and butter in a large saucepan over low heat. After the butter melts, cool mixture. Stir in cream, ginger, baking soda, and flour. Let dough stand overnight.

Preheat oven to 400°. Divide dough into thirds. Roll each piece very thin. Use a cookie cutter to cut out shapes. Bake cookies on greased cookie sheets for 5 to 7 min. Cool on a rack. Makes 7-8 doz.


