Dear Ms Fitzgibbon,

I write in response to your letter dated 5th October 2010 and our subsequent telephone conversation on 14th October 2010 in relation to difficulties with horses and motorbikes etc in the Clondalkin area along the Grand Canal.

As you are aware there was a recently a significant upgrade to the towpaths through this area including improved widened surfacing, public lighting and CCTV. This project, known as the Green Route, was a joint project between South Dublin County Council, Dublin City Council, Waterways Ireland and ESB, and extends along the south bank of the Grand Canal from Inchicore (3rd Lock) to Lucan (12th Lock). The project is currently in maintenance period of 12 months from 18th June (36 months for the landscaping elements) and the future maintenance arrangements are being finalised through a Steering Group with members from each of the bodies listed above and the consultants supervising the project.

In future maintenance the public lighting, CCTV and bin emptying will be looked after by the local authorities, but Waterways Ireland own the lands and are responsible for other elements along the paths and the lock areas. The Gardai have been consulted as part of this process and one issue being addressed is a legal issue of coming on to 'private property' to address public order issues, although clearly this path is 'public' property for use by all. As indicated this is an ongoing process and I would hope to have more clarity on the outcomes shortly.

I trust this addresses your query at this stage, and you may also wish to liaise with the relevant personnel in the Council about their role in addressing the issues raised.
