## **OUESTION NO. 4**

**QUESTION:** Councillor G. O'Connell

To ask the Manager to outline the options now open to this Council to have the name "Palmerstown" established as the official title for this historic area and to include in the answer precisely the area that is in fact described as "Palmerton" is in the ordnance survey maps. Is it the Village, if yes, what is the location of this village, if the Townland, what are the boundaries of this townland?

### REPLY:

Two maps are attached to this report: The first is the modern OSI map base upon which the two Townlands which carry the Palmerston name ( Palmerston Upper and Palmerston Lower ) are highlighted. These are the two Townlands from which the Village and the locality draws it's generic name. As you car see the "Village of Palmerston" as we know it today is mostly situated within these two Townland Boundaries.

The <u>second map</u> is a copy of the first edition of OS mapping dated 1843 which shows the same townland boundaries in green and the Protestant Parish Boundary of PALMERSTON in Red. It is clearly evident from this map that historically Palmerston has been the area name.

As indicated on previous occasions the procedure to change the official name of a street, place or locality is set out in the Local Government Act, 1946, the Local Government (Changing of Placenames) Regulations 1956, as amended by Sec. 67 LG Act 1994. It can only be done by way of conducting a plebiscite of the qualified electors in the area and the consent of the majority of qualified electors is required for any change to be made by resolution of the Council.
