- The parking spaces that are being removed are designed to be the most heavily used spaces in the village and can probably turn over 3-4 cars per hour on average. Removal of 24 spaces from this specific area is analogous to removing 80-100 spaces from elsewhere in the village
- Your Parking data was collected during COVID19 restrictions when office workers were being
 advised to Work From Home, cafes and restaurants were functioning at reduced capacity and
 traffic volumes were way below average in the village. From what I understand new parking
 data was collected by SDCC in December 2021 but these results have not been used. Why
 not? This appears to be an intentional effort by planners to mislead residents about the real
 impact of the plan.
- No data has been provided for "turnover of spaces". This is a crucial metric in any discussion
 around parking data. This metric seems to have been ignored for the purpose of this plan
 even though it's available. This appears to be an intentional effort by planners to mislead
 residents about the real impact of the plan.
- Much of the green areas outlined in the file "10 VG Existing Vehicle Parking Usage" are
 intended for residential parking as well as business parking. This is not exclusive parking for
 businesses and cannot make up for the parking that will be lost as part of this plan. Are
 SDCC adhering to national and local guidelines in terms of the provision of parking for local
 businesses, retail and otherwise? I sincerely doubt it and this is now set to get much worse
- It needs to be communicated to residents that this loss of parking will be in addition to a further significant loss of parking on the main st between Ulster Bank and Numero 6 if the proposed one-way traffic trial goes ahead later in 2022.

- The proposed additional parking spaces are completely insufficient and nowhere near a likefor-like replacement for what is being removed.
- It is also highly questionable how viable or safe these proposed new spaces would even be. For example, the 2 spaces proposed to be located at the entrance to the AIB staff carpark. This is already a very narrow part of the road where the bus lane is merging with normal traffic. It is also the point where the traffic is splitting into 2 lanes I.e. those turning left onto the village green and those going straight. Throw people getting out of their cars into the mix, as well as cars parallel parking and then leaving their spaces and you have a complete mess and a real safety hazard.
- The proposed location for the spaces outside Carroll's Pub is very similar in profile, a narrow section of the road that is about to split into 2 lanes. There's also a bus stop at this exact

point. Is this really safe?

• For these reasons I'm left wondering, are these proposed additional spaces even part of the plan or are they just "proposed" and may be scrapped at a later date if deemed unviable/unsafe? Another attempt to artificially minimise the full impact of the plan perhaps?

- I do not believe this plan will improve traffic congestion in the village in any meaningful way as the root causes still exist. The location of the M50 toll and the fact that the outer ring road remains unbuilt will ensure that Lucan remains choked up in peak times. These are unavoidable truths completely outside the control of SDCC but now, as well as traffic congestion at peak times, locals will also have the added burden of having nowhere to park in the village. In your questionnaire survey, the highest % went to the issue of "parking and traffic". This score was 92.5%. This clearly says that people need more parking and less traffic to make this a 'destination'. The parked vehicles in the village or indeed the people driving to and from them are not disruptive to the atmosphere or ambience. It is the 'rat-run' traffic volumes from people using Lucan Village and Bridge to cross the River Liffey. From what I can see, this plan would simply remove much needed parking but maintain the high volumes of non-locals who are passing through every day. This removal of pass-through traffic would completely change the feeling in the village. People could travel to this 'destination' from the surrounding areas, park conveniently and use the restaurants, cafes, medical centre etc in relative peace and quiet. Reduced volumes would allow remaining traffic to be controlled through traffic-calming measures such as speed ramps etc which would make it more pleasant for pedestrians.

Lastly and crucially, the existing parking is very very important to those who use important amenities such as the Medial Centre, pharmacies and even the Centra. These are a lifeline for residents and parking now is very difficult with 3 or 4 laps of the village green often needed to get a space. I have elderly relatives in Lucan village who I often have to drive door to door for medical appointments. It is pretty ridiculous to think that removal of parking spaces will help the locals when you will still have massive volumes rolling through the village.

Overall, the plan appears to offer many benefits to Lucan village.

Diverting traffic from the main street will make the village a much more pleasant place for both locals and tourists to spend time. By moving car parking spaces from the main street to secondary roads, the village centre will look less cluttered, be more aesthetically pleasing, and will be a more enjoyable place to eat, enjoy coffee and walk.

Three points to consider:

- 1. If we want people to walk/cycle to Lucan village rather than drive there, we need to ensure that the main roads to the village are safe and secure. I have reviewed the plans currently being proposed by SDCC for the development of the Village Green, Weir Side and Lucan Demesne entrance.

The proposals are very impressive and the drawings indeed paint a very attractive picture of Lucan as a destination village.

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What the plans seem to have forgotten is that Lucan is first and foremost a thriving community, with numerous businesses providing services and employment to the local residents. It is where we live, send our children to school, socialise, go the bank or doctor, and indeed where many of us work.

It strikes me, reviewing this plan, that it is focussed entirely on improving the leisure time of both locals and visitors, while neglecting entirely the realities of day-to-day life for the local residents.

Traffic jams and shortage of parking are a bleak fact of life for us, and it seems that this plan, rather than addressing this reality in any way, is determined to make the situation worse by removing up to 54 parking spaces, especially those that are almost permanently occupied around the village green and along Main St.

I am in the fortunate position where I can walk to my local shops, and I avoid driving if at all possible because it is simply too hard to get parking. Not everyone is in the same position. A mum or dad with 3 young kids in tow or an elderly person needs to be able to park near where they want to do business. And if they cannot do so, they will take their business elsewhere. IT IS THAT SIMPLE!

It is naïve of our councillors to think that they can remove these spaces without affecting in a serious way the ability of our local businesses, the life-blood of our local community, to survive, and it is an inevitable consequence of these proposals that many of local businesses will find they are not able to continue. Instead of an attractive destination village, we are in danger of seeing the main street in Lucan become a street of empty buildings.

I note that the current plan is based in a significant way on the future development of a proposed canal loop greenway link which will attract walkers and cyclists to Lucan. But this is only a proposal, and as we have seen before many, many times, it may never reach fruition.

So if this link is not in existence, will we have all these visitors at all? And if so, how are they going to arrive here? Unfortunately, they are unlikely to come by public transport. For such a large urban centre, Lucan is spectacularly badly served by public transport – it is the bus or the bus. And given that the bus sits in the same traffic jams as the rest of us, I think it is safe to say most people will drive, thus exacerbating the problem with the limited parking available.

In my view, it should be your priority as our elected councillors to focus on the needs of the local Lucan residents, who pay substantial property taxes, and our local businesses, who pay substantial rates, to improve our facilities, services and quality of life first and foremost.

I do not mean to be entirely negative in my submission. The plans to improve the access and visual appearance of the bridge-side weir entrance are very welcome, as are many aspects of the improvements planned for the entrance to Lucan Demesne.

I hope that you will consider my concerns and amend the proposals for the Village Green and Main St so that they do not adversely affect our ability to access our local businesses and services.

Traffic approaching point A above will be heavily impacted by the proposed pedestrianisation highlighted in the image. This will cause traffic to be backed up onto the N4 approaching Lucan from the west, city bound at Junction 4a.

At point B above, traffic approaching from the bridge at Laraghcon will no longer be able to turn right into the village at the roundabout due to the proposed one way system highlighted in red. This will result in a constant flow for traffic approaching the village from the hill adjacent to St. Mary's boys school, affording little or no opportunity for cars utilising the one way system to exit the village to proceed, thus causing further delays and a knock on effect to traffic mentioned in my first point above. It is highly likely that this will extend on to the N4 for some distance at peak times, bringing traffic to a standstill beyond the point at which the N4 becomes the M4. This will also impact traffic attempting to join the N4 from the Leixlip / Celbridge East slip road at Liffey Valley par 3 golf. This would be catastrophic in the usual course of events, and not to mention if there is an accident or closure on the M50, increasing the number of cars seeking an alternate route between the Northside and Southside.

Point C highlighted above requires a sharp right turn. This will now be the only option for HGVs entering Lucan at the bridge at Laraghcon, attempting to transit through, or deliver to Lucan Village. With the proposed works ongoing, as well as ongoing housing developments and works extending up the Newcastle Road and other areas in and around Lucan, there will be a significant increase in such vehicles. The time it will take to make this turn for one vehicle alone will mean a bare minimum of vehicles will be permitted to pass through the lights at this point in a single cycle. When you factor in that there are several schools in this area, again, the word catastrophic is the only way to describe the resulting traffic.

All of the above will, inevitably, further impact the disastrous traffic situation attempting to enter Lucan village at point D, which will affect all traffic attempting to exit the N4 at Junction 4.

With the vast increase in the population of Lucan and surrounding areas in recent times, which is expected to continue on an ongoing basis, surely the emphasis should be on improving the flow of

traffic in the area. The proposed works are, to put it mildly, counterproductive in this regard.

Theme: Traffic

There are a number of aspects relating to the proposal which will not help traffic flow in the area and will lead to clear negative impacts in my opinion:

- 1. The addition of car parking spaces outside AIB will reduce carriageway width in this area to a single lane. The existing road allows two channels of cars here (one to go left into the village and onwards towards Laraghcon, the other to go straight past Courtneys up towards the residential areas such as Beech Park / Grove, Chalet Gardens, Roselawn, Ballydowd). The left turning lane particularly in evening times is effectively a very slow moving queue. Drivers wanting to go straight should not be burdened with sitting in this.
- 2. The extension of the pathway outside Carrols pub to facilitate a bus stop which appears to

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show a stopping bus blocking traffic would again hurt traffic flow in the area.

Traffic is a big problem in Lucan village as a consequence of developements across the river (Laraghcon & so on) which have been developed without proper consideration of a suitable traffice outlet for them to main arterial roads such as the N4 which causes them to fill the village areas with traffic. Lucan village is a hub for a variety of services for the entire Lucan community. The main services located in the Main Street are a Medical Clinic, Pharmacy, Banks, Garda Station, Supermarket, Post Office and a number of restaurants.

The majority of people who need to access these services are predominantly older, disabled, ill, parents with young children and people who are unable to walk any distance.

Of course the biggest priority is access to the doctors surgery and the pharmacy and as it currently stands parking in this area does not meet the demand. There are four doctors, a team of nurses and other healthcare professionals providing services from the Main Street area. It is unbelieveable that anyone could be considering reducing parking in this area when in our society we have

Approximately 1 million people in Ireland today suffer from Diabetes, Asthma, Chronic Obstructive

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Pulmonary Disease (COPD) or Cardiovascular disease. The Irish longitudinal study on ageing, TILDA, reports that 64.8% of our over 65 age cohort live with co-morbidity.

In Ireland and indeed right across the world chronic diseases are the major cause of morbidity and mortality. Many diseases that were previously considered to be infectious or acute conditions are now classified as chronic conditions due to medical advances in treatment.

The prevalence of most chronic conditions increases with age. With the population in Ireland ageing, this will mean an increase in the percentage of the population with one or more of these conditions and all of these people will most likely have reduced mobility requiring regular medical care at their GP surgery.

Chronic Conditions and Ageing Arthritis

Arthritis is an inflammation of the joints that can cause pain and immobility. There are many different types, the most common of which is osteoarthritis. Arthritis is a major cause of pain and disability in older people. Some 10% of the population aged 15+ report having arthritis. It is among the most prevalent chronic condition amongst older adults.

It is estimated that 27% of the total population are estimated to have a musculoskeletal condition, i.e. arthritis, back pain or osteoporosis. There were 12,721 people on the rheumatoid arthritis register4 in NI in 2019 (DOH NI, 2019d).

Diabetes

Diabetes is a disease caused by too high a level of sugar (glucose) in the blood. There are 141,500 adults aged 20-79 years with diabetes in Ireland. Diabetes prevalence increases with age to over 11% of the population aged 75+. This indicates that a sizeable number of people aged 80+ would have to be added to the above total with diabetes.

Coronary Heart Disease

Coronary heart disease (CHD) is a group of diseases that includes angina and heart attack. It is a leading cause of death among older adults in Ireland. 6% of people aged 56+ report having had a heart attack and 4.5% report having angina. CHD-related disability becomes more prevalent with age e.g. among those aged 50-59 the rates are 1.6% in Ireland. Among those aged 80+ the rates are 8.3%.

Hypertension (high blood pressure)

Hypertension is a chronic condition in which the blood pressure in the arteries is elevated, increasing the risk of heart attack and stroke. It is estimated that 40% of older adults (54+) have high blood pressure.

Stroke

A stroke occurs when poor blood flow to the brain causes cell death. In Ireland around 10,000 people of all ages have a stroke annually, while there are upwards of 30,000 people living with disabilities as a result of a stroke. Three out of four people who experience a stroke are aged 65 or over (HSC, 2017).

Cancer

Cancer is a group of diseases involving abnormal cell growth with the potential to invade or spread to other parts of the body. An average of 22,321 new cases of cancer are diagnosed each year in ROI and the five most common cancers are non-melanoma skin cancer, prostate cancer, breast cancer, bowel cancer and lung cancer (National Cancer Registry of Ireland, 2018). It is projected that one in two people in ROI will develop cancer during their lifetime (Irish Cancer Society, 2018). Cancer occurs primarily among older people with 63% of cases in people aged 65+ and highest incidence rates in those aged 85-89.

Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD)

COPD is the umbrella term for a collection of lung diseases including chronic bronchitis and emphysema. It mainly affects those over 35 and is most commonly caused by smoking. Around 110,000 people in ROI have been diagnosed with COPD but it is thought there are up to 380,000 people living with the disease who have not been diagnosed. It is more common in areas of high social deprivation. (HSE, nd). COPD causes over 1,600 deaths a year in ROI and a high number of hospitalisations. Prevalence increases with age with around one in five of medical card holders aged 75+ on COPD-related medication (Irish Thoracic Society, 2018). TILDA data indicates 13% of people aged 56+ in ROI have a respiratory condition (DOH, 2019). In NI there were 42,235 people on the COPD register in 2019, a prevalence rate of 2.1% of the total population. (DOH NI, 2019d). Respiratory mortality (all-cause) for under-75s is over three times higher in the most deprived areas compared to the least deprived areas (DOH NI, 2020b).

Dementia

Dementia is a broad category of brain diseases that cause a long term decrease in mental capacity, particularly in the ability to process and remember. Alzheimer's disease is the most common type of dementia, followed by vascular dementia which is related to impeded blood flow in the brain. There are several other types. There were estimated to be around 47,000 people with dementia in ROI in 2011 and this number has been projected to grow to 132,000 by 2041. The rate varies by gender and increases sharply with age – e.g. 1.8% of men and 1.4% of women aged 65-69 have dementia compared with 20.9% of men and 28.5% of women aged 85-89.

These statistics are very stark and and behind each one of these statistics lies a vulnerable person who needs to attend their doctor and most like the pharmacy on a very regular basis. All of these people will have associated mobility issues which again need the ability to be to park adjacent to the GP, pharmacy, post office, supermarket, banks and garda station. The fact that that it is being considered to be taking parking away in this area is scandalous in a climate where Ireland has signed up to UNCRPD and trying to improve the lives of those who have disabilities. As a country we have an obligation to enable people to live long healthy lives in their own homes and communities and not be putting barriers which enable people to be independent. I am a very regular user of over 10 businesses in the village, 5 of which are on the main street facing the green. During my last three trips to the village, I was unable to find free spaces anywhere (this included the spaces all the way up the Lucan Rd past the petrol station) on one occassion and so gave up, I got a space by the EBS on the second occassion and walked back, and I drove around for 15 minutes waiting to get one the last time there. My family and I rely on these businesses for both business and personal use and it is frustrating at present trying to access them.

A reduction of parking spaces is going to make the situation in the village worse and will deter locals from using local businesses there. The reduction in spaces in this area will make it very difficult to access a village which has no public off-street parking. Instead of reducing spaces this proposal should include an increase in parking spaces, with off-street being a priority. Of the proposed

additional spaces, 4 on the Lucan Rd at the AIB are on a very busy piece of road and are not ideal for families. The additional spaces near Carrolls appear to just be the re-instatement of the space taken over for seating during covid. This also seems to be the case for the 4 spaces on the hill near the Village Café which are a switch with the spaces lost for Bus Connect changes late last year, converting the spaces at St VdeP into an additional bus stop. Also the fact that the spaces on the Centra side of the road along the green are given over to a Loading bay until 11 will not help.

Reduction in Car Parking Spaces

I object to the reduction in car parking spaces in Lucan Village for the following reasons:-

The traffic survey on which current use of spaces is based cannot be relied upon as it was carried out at a time when traffic had decreased significantly because of Covid. A survey taken now that activity has increased somewhat would indicate that empty parking spaces in the Lucan area are very difficult to find and that lack of car parking spaces is problematic.

Lucan village is in a valley with steep hills on each side. The population living in the valley is not sufficient to maintain an economically viable village even allowing for a potential increase in tourism. Shops, pharmacies, banks, the post office *etc* rely on those driving to the village to do business. At present drivers tend to circuit the town a few times and if parking is not available, continue on to one of the many local shopping centres. Any reduction in car parking will exacerbate the problem for local businesses.

There is insufficient car parking as it stands. This was stressed by many responding to the CHL Consulting Lucan Survey 2021 which was carried out on behalf of South Dublin County Council, where in the Traffic and Parking open ended question section, 34% of comments stated that more parking was required. (This does not include the number of responses that stated parking was a problem but did not make it clear if they would like more or less parking).

Lucan businesses must compete with those in nearby shopping centres who benefit from ample free car parking for their customers. A change to the already precarious balance may tilt it to the point where businesses in the village become unsustainable. If this happens Lucan village will be destroyed as an amenity. There is nothing attractive about almost deserted villages. They feel unsafe and encourage a level of criminality. Banks and post offices give lack of customers as the reason for closure on a regular basis. If we prioritise potential tourism over existing residents who drive to the village to do business, we risk losing the very facilities that make Lucan attractive.

The report by DHB Architects did not seem to grasp how serious this could be. At section A2.3 page 7, it states "the Green's rediscovered presence and proximity will encourage those using the Centra to bring their sandwich to the river's edge..." Centra requires local shoppers who buy groceries *etc* and use the post office. These people are likely to have driven to do their shopping. The person buying a sandwich to have in the park would be welcome addition to trade, but it cannot be a choice between that visitor and the local shopper who must now shop elsewhere because of lack of parking. Without local custom retailers will not survive.

The report states at section A1.3 page 5 "By proposing a shared surface to eliminate kerbs and abrupt changes to levels and surfaces we can make the street more universally accessible, for wheelchair users, for the seeing-impaired and for those of reduced mobility". There is a lack of understanding that this user group are most likely to arrive into the village by car and require car parking facilities whether they be conducting their business, visiting a medical facility or just enjoying the village's amenities. If they cannot find parking, they will have to go elsewhere.

I object to the proposal to decrease free parking time. With the present free 30 minutes, car users tend to do their business quickly and free up spaces on a regular basis. If they need extra time for medical appointments *etc* the additional cost is not prohibitive. Reducing free time to 15 minutes will discourage people from shopping in Lucan and entice cars away from our village, while penalising those who must park in the village for medical appointments etc.

Tourists are not exclusively cyclists and pedestrians. They include people who drive to the area to enjoy it. Without sufficient parking spaces for the existing population, these tourists will not find a place to park and will go to destinations which cater for them.

It is misleading to include the car parking spaces at the entrance to the Demesne as car parking spaces for Lucan Village. These spaces are almost a kilometre from the village. Drivers who are still searching for a parking space at that stage will continue on to Tesco shopping precinct in the Dodsboro area which is closer to the Demesne entrance.

To increase the amenity value of Lucan village, for businesses, local people and tourists, South Dublin County Council should consider acquiring a space within the village or its immediate surrounds for a car park that would provide an adequate parking solution for all concerned.

I object to the present proposals for the village as I think they would cause irreparable damage. It is an experiment from which some businesses which have been the heart of our village may not recover.

The weeping willow (Salix Alba) is a landmark and an integral part of the park. It is a graceful and long established tree that changes with the seasons. Willow branches are slender, are bare in winter

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and have an aethereal appearance as they begin to get their catkins and leaves in spring. Because of its features and the fact that it is at the very end of the park, it does not screen the park from the Main Street to any meaningful extent. I recommend that it should not be removed but incorporated into the design of the park.

The chestnut trees in the park are not the usual horse chestnut trees. They are Aesculus carnea, the red horse chestnut, quite unusual, covered with striking red spears of flower in spring. I object to the proposal to remove one of these chestnut trees.

The proposed drastic reduction in parking space seems to ignore the huge local catchment area that has grown around the village in the last 30 years. There's a medical centre and other health related outlets in the village which many local people have long-established relationships with. The customers of the medical centre and health outlets, and all Lucan area residents who currently use businesses in the village, would find it vastly more difficult to access those services if the proposed reduction in parking goes ahead.

Lucan is not an isolated quaint village which would be a tourism hotspot if it hadn't been ruined by an over-proliferation of parking, which the council's documentation appears to be trying to suggest. It's the local town centre for a population of about 60,000 people. If the availability of parking doesn't reflect that reality, the village will become decimated as people are forced to look elsewhere to obtain the services they currently access in Lucan.

As holders of a disabled parking permit (our son has mobility issues), my wife and I have specific concerns about the availability of accessible parking that we would like to highlight.

- How many of the parking spaces in the village will be accessible?
- Will all accessible spaces now require parallel parking? Perpendicular parking is recommended for safety.
- Will all accessible spaces have 1.2m hatching around the sides and rear of each bay? Some spaces currently only have hatching on one side and others have none. Hatching is especially vital when traffic, cycle lanes, steel bollards and street furniture are on the parking space perimeter.
- EV bays should be accessible. They will make up a minority of the total spaces and having, for example, only one accessible EV bay would not be practical.
- Cycle parking areas need to be very spacious too. The area needs to allow for parking of tricycles, cargo bikes, ride on scooters and all the various types of accessible bikes that will be hired out at points on the cycleway.

At present drivers have to circuit the town a few times in the hope of finding parking. I frequently give up and head to one of the local shopping centres. These proposals would significantly increase the problem. In particular disabled people and the elderly are dependent on being able to park to access the facilities in the village. There is insufficient car parking as it stands. This was stressed by many responding to the CHL Consulting Lucan Survey 2021 which was carried out on behalf of South Dublin County Council. While I welcome any investment in Lucan this latest village proposal losing Any of the Existing parking is misguided and damaging to the functional life of those who need to access locations in Lucan village.

The 2017 study "Women on Wheels" commissioned by DCC revealed a stubbornly low rate (27%) of participation in cycling by women which is consistent with global trends - so any loss of parking or roadspace to facilitate cycle lanes is inherently misogynistic; and particularly damages the lives of women who carry a disproportionately heavier caring load which can only be discharged by their ability to drive children, disabled and elderly relatives and their wheelchairs/rollators and prams to their medical commercial educational and hospitality locations.

Lucan needs more disabled parking, facilities for electric cars, set down areas for electric disability friendly taxis, better security via HD CCTV and LED street lighting, street furniture for those with mobility issues and most importantly a publicly owned site for a designated Primary healthcare centre with parking in the SDCC strategic development plan for Lucan village.

We also should have had the Luas since 2012 to give at least some car owners a practical option not to have to use a car.

Its important that this proposal and all SDCC proposals be gender and Age proofed for unintended consequences; and biodiversity be protected via an EPA assessment of proposed changes - eg birdlife on the Lucan river may be disturbed by the disruption, assumed removal of overhead perching cables and closer proximity to pedestrians.

My parking requirements are usually short term and the loss of 80 parking spaces in the village will certainly mean a great risk when accessing the village that I will not be able to get a place, The areas adjacent to the village on all sides are generally considerably uphill. I live in Beech Grove Beech Park area and in my 70's year of age. It would be very difficult for me with the increased risk of no parking place to walk to the village and a major hill up to return home in all types of weather. If this reduction is to go ahead then SDCC should have proposals for loical smaller bus type services that visit into all the estates so we can access thge village. I do not accept the veracity sample survey of parking taken by SDCC between 29 November 2021 and 5 December 2021. This was clearly in the middle of the Covid19 Pandemic and would not be representitive of higher demands at normal times. In particular I challenge the correctiveness of vacant car parking spaces as cited as being representitive. I have lived in Lucan for over 50 years and SCCC in this period have had opportunities to secure off street car parking close to the village but have made no real effort in this regard. Now to take essential parking places that have been in existence for a number of yeares is not acceptable or practical. I am also concerned with plans for promotion of cross county/ inter county cycleways being directed right into the hearet of our village. Rather than going through the heart of our village these cycleways could easily be diverted in the plan to the east and west ends of the village and not through the heart of it. Have SDcc considered the increased use of electric scooter and electric bikes in addition to normal cycles. These have become a hazard in many areas without controls and a danger to pedestrians and without Insurances or identifications. Firstly, I would say that the proposed enhancements to Lucan Village are great. However any public realm works must consider a number of key issues:

- the product being presented to the public
- how the public will access what is being presented
- the impact on existing businesses in the area and their clients

The proposed works over focus on the first element without sufficient attention to the other two. With the overall growth in the greater Lucan area, any substantial works undertaken must deliver more parking in the village rather than less. Therefore, I would make the following suggestions:

- The parking on the businesses side of the road between AIB and O'Neills should be retained
 with the exception of the removal of 2 3 spaces to facilitate the movement of the new bus
 stop outside the AIB around the corner into the village
- No new parking spaces should be provided on the main road outside the AIB. This part of the
 road is already congested with cars turning into the village and those going straight up the hill.
 A better proposal for this area is to have a filter lane for the village with a separate lane for
 traffic going straight ahead
- The 12 herring-bone style parking spaces between Kenny's and the bridge should be retained and upgraded in line with the proposed works
- The 19 spaces on the river side of the road should be removed to facilitate the proposed works but these need to be replaced with alternative spaces which are within a 100 metre walk of the village centre. To achieve this, I would propose that the area of land marked in Red in the attached should be acquired by the council and developed as a carpark. Access to this area can be achieved through the Health Centre grounds with the potential for pedestrian access through the existing entrance to Carroll's carpark. This area could provide 20 30 parking spaces and thus increase the overall level of parking available in the village centre. A usage charge would go some way to offsetting the cost of this facility.

While, I understand that a parking survey carried out recently suggested that there is not a parking issue in the village, I can confirm from 38 years of using the village that parking is currently very difficult to get during business hours in the village.

While I would very much support the proposed works in the village, these can only be undertaken if adequate replacement parking is provided in the centre of the village.

Lucan Village:

Sufficient disability parking/set down spaces need to be provided and reserved – for access to medical services and also shops.

Traffic is a serious issue for the wellbeing of the people of Lucan and also in the promotion of Lucan as a historic village. This problem needs to be tackled through South Dublin CC and Fingal CC working together to find ways of relieving through traffic which crosses the Liffey bridge to avoid M50 tolls.

We are in favour of more public seating.

We welcome the provision of underground ducting of services and electric vehicle charging points.

We are in favour of suitably placed cycle rails for parking.

Lucan needs signage highlighting our historic buildings and sites – for example, the 13C Church and Graveyard of Blessed Virgin Mary.

Historic sites such as above Church and Graveyard should be developed and open to the public.

The Council should explore the opportunity to acquire - or at the very least obtain greater access to - some or all of the grounds of the Italian ambassador's residence.

Explore alternative car parking spaces – e.g. Church of Ireland car park – by arrangement.

All the bins in the village are in poor condition. Solar (belly) bins for sustainability have already been proposed. These and also some heritage style bins would be welcome.

The redundant telephone kiosks located in the main street alongside the Griffeen river should be removed. We suggest replacing with an old-style telephone box, possibly containing a working defibrillator or book exchange facilities as has been successfully provided in other villages.

Whenever 'The Schoolmaster's House' is being developed by the potential purchaser, this development needs to be in keeping with overall character of the village.

This is an opportune time to encourage businesses to enhance their shop fronts, in keeping with the character of the village. This could be promoted through the SDCC existing grants scheme.

Village Green:

We agree that the Village Green needs refurbishment. Overall renovations need to reflect the character of the village. It should still retain the features of a local village green as opposed to modernisation for its sake alone. Natural materials, such as wood, stone, should be used in any upgrade, as opposed to industrial materials such as concrete etc. We do not believe we need a modern plaza or a concrete thoroughfare. It should remain a green space, with native planting, pollinator friendly plants and wildflowers.

The existing wooden fencing at the raised flowerbeds is rotten and at the very least needs to be replaced and likewise with the existing seating. We agree that the existing railings along the riverbank need to be replaced. We propose a dedicated notice board for community groups such as Tidy Towns, as exists in many other similar parks around the country.

The Griffeen river is a feature of the village. It is important to respect this and the plant, fish, bird and animal life within in any renovations that are happening.

Appropriate lighting of the village green should be installed – for ensuring a family friendly atmosphere.

Some heritage style bins should be provided here and serviced 7 days a week.

Lucan Tidy Towns, in cooperation with the locally based staff of SDCC, specifically invest time and effort in maintaining the village green as it presently exists and presenting it as best we can. As a feature in the heart of Lucan village, we highlight it in our National Tidy Towns competition application each year. We are working on the assumption that none of this proposed Part 8 development will take place before the end of 2022. Free parking is provided at Liffey Valley, Lucan Shopping Centre and Hillcrest Shopping Centre. This already places Lucan Village at competitive disadvantage to these retail locations which are outside of established town/village centres. While pay-parking is accepted in Lucan Village to avoid all-day parking by bus commuters and ensure turnover in spaces, the current number of spaces is clearly already at the lower level of what is required in the village in order to remain competitive with other nearby centres.

All phenomenal local people and tourist facilities on our doorstep not being properly progressed or promoted.

Include these in your Lucan public realm proposals which are all understated and under managed attributes on your doorstep that could be enjoyed by locals and tourists alike without conflict or detriment.

I interpret the current set of proposals as a somewhat short sighted, narrow vision and poor deployment of local authority expenditure and tax payers money given what it actually achieves immediately and in the short term and the potential damage it could have in the longer term.

Review the competing alternatives in the Lucan area which are impacting and challenging the retail

success and diversity of the village namely:

Ballyowen Shopping Centre, Anchored by Spar

Newcastle road = Anchored by Supervalu & Dunnes +++

Hillcrest - Anchored by Tesco +++

Adamstown = Anchored by Aldi & Londis +++

Liffey valley = Anchored by Major National Multiples +++,

Fonthill road = Aldi, Lidl, Eurasia ++++.

All of the above prosper at the expense of the traditional village centres, this is not a recent phenomenon nor a concept unique to Lucan.

Retail parks and suburban district shopping centres make it increasingly difficult for traditional villages to survive. Ease of access and parking making them much more attractive propositions to which people happily commute in their cars.

The retail uses in the traditional village centre will continue to die out slowly and you will be left with not a primary, secondary or even tertiary retail location – commercially it will fail miserably.

The correct thing and the real challenge would be to provide more easy access safe parking in the village for a diverse range of vehicles with appropriate electric charging points for cars, bikes, cargo bikes, mobility scooters etc etc

The people issuing these directives and making the decisions need to consider more carefully the evolving nature of villages and basic retail fundamentals and dynamics.

Consider the potential impact of further High Street bank closures, more challenges to existing retail units, pharmacy and Medical centre = remove these from the equation and what are you left with ?????

If you don't have significant anchor retail units to attract footfall everything else dies. (referred to in retail terms as the "dumbbell effect")

Weekend tourism flurries do not sustain a diverse healthy functioning village centre for local people.

Questions and recommendations.

Has a Cost benefit analysis been carried out for the proposal to understand the financial influences and impacts?

The landscaping proposal needs re-visiting in terms of selection and appropriateness of trees, flora and fauna.

The traffic count needs to be carried out at an appropriate time not Covid times.

Like it or loathe it parking is a part of everyday modern life requirements and needs to be taken due account of. Ignoring it or having the wrong data upon which you base decisions would be seriously naïve and flawed decision making.

Have the designers explored the retention of or indeed the **increased requirements for car parking** in the village should the proposal be an overwhelming tourism success in conjunction with the already established local needs?

The imagery shown to present the scheme should reflect more carefully the reality with car parking as it will be utilised and occupied.

Proper Photomontages should be presented to assist those less familiar with this style of proposal and presentation format. Do not produce imagery that is not a true representation.

If it is tourism you wish to promote in Lucan this is not the starting point.

If it is for local needs and to sustain the heart of the village with a diverse range of occupiers and services then you really need to think further, deeper and more long term.

This is a proposal that optically looks pleasing however resolves very little and could exacerbate traffic problems further in the village and serve to alienate local people more than they are already with difficulty of access and restricted parking provisions.

There is an opportunity to bring all parties and people to the table and on board.

At a minimum and given the significance of his location community workshops and proper community presentation and public consultation is a minimum requirement especially now that Covid restrictions are being lifted.

Title: Pedestrian Access to St. Catherine's Park and Compatibility with historic plans of heritage importance.

Theme: Village Enhancement.

Considering the proposals for modified car parking provision at / near the entrance to St. Catherine's park and the current village proposal, I suggest that plans be drawn up to integrate these proposals by developing a generous footpath and dedicated cycle lanes between the two. Part of the wall separating the R835 and the Italian Ambassador's residence collapsed some years ago and it continues to deteriorate. Given the nature of the land holding, perhaps there is a role for the Department of Foreign Affairs. A strip of approximately 6m width would accommodate the improvement using a retaining structure. It would be desirable, of course, to recreate a stone wall boundary.

With respect to the current Lucan Village proposal, please be aware that this area is a historically planned area. I believe the council should, as part of the Appropriate Assessment, prepare an expert study that identifies historic plans and features in a heritage framework. Accepting that change can be necessary, it is wise to identify heritage features and concepts, explain their significance and indicate their degree of compatibility with the proposed scheme. A good scheme will avoid discarding heritage features or concepts if they need not be discarded and thus honor the efforts of past settlement planners.

I wish to register my shock and sadness at the divisions and upset this proposal has caused in Lucan, particularly at this time of great global distress at what conflict can bring.

Much of the division could have been avoided if the consultation on which the plan is based had included the very people who are most impacted by this plan, those for whom **accessibility** is everything.

The architects for the plan, CHL, is a Waterford based practice and it conducted its CHL Survey & Consultation in May 2021, a time when over 60's and health compromised people were not fully vaccinated and still cocooning/shielding, thereby unavailable for street survey. Although the survey was available online, it does not appear from the responses I viewed that many of this cohort participated.

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Furthermore, SDCC itself does not appear to have considered how to apply its Age Friendly County Strategy aims to its planning. This county has one of the fastest growing % changes in persons over 65 and the Lucan Village area is central to the lives of hundreds of older residents in the older estates close to the village. A thousand visits a week are made to the Medical centre on Main St and many others use the banks, shop, post office and pharmacy, yet there's not one Age Friendly parking space.

SDCC officials I met at the Library last week presented the plan as an "all or nothing" plan, take it in full or lose it. There did not appear to be any room for adaptation of the plan to include the surface and park improvements but not the parking changes. On that basis, I'm objecting to the proposal as I feel its not based on need but on a vision funded by Bord Failte. Vision is necessary for change but it must be inclusive.

If other funding must be found, I suggest the huge increased revenue in Local Property Tax paid by Lucan homeowners would help significantly.

On behalf of Helen Farrell, Elaine Hurley, Paul Butler, Jonathan Cully, Darren Tully & Lesley Jenkins Blairsdale, who form the Committee of Society for Old Lucan, 2021-22.

There are many positives about these proposals and we wish to focus on these first. We are delighted that SDCC wishes to invest and develop Lucan village both in terms of improvements for residents of the Lucan area, and in terms of Lucan as a destination town in the near future.

With Lucan's rich archaeology, history and heritage, there is much that can be capitalised on for these plans and in future development in the area, but in a way that improves and conserves the historic features and streetscapes.

Overall, the project will greatly improve accessibility for all, for pedestrians using and navigating the village, whether people are using mobility devices or are parents using buggies for young children.

The improvement to the service infrastructure in the village green area, especially by putting services underground, is a great improvement on the current situation. This will have additional benefits to creating a village accessible to all and will have the added benefit of improving the visual impact of the village.

Providing more benches and street furniture will have a positive impact on the use of the village generally.

The plans (subject to some changes) will have the potential to bring more people (both from the surrounding areas, and domestic tourists) into the village, which will benefit village traders & businesses, and will increase the positive awareness of Lucan as a quality destination town.

The plans for the demesne car-park are also seen as very positive and well thought-out.

While some of the debate online has focused on parking issues, we felt that there are other potential drawbacks to aspects of the current proposal that would benefit from adjustments.

We felt that the remodelling of the Village Green area, particularly along the NE / Eastern sides, may result in a potential safety issue to park users, by removing the existing robust stone wall; park users will have little between them and fast-moving traffic. The lack of a barrier on the NE limits of the park could also prove a safety issue for parents with young children, as no barrier will exist between park users and the traffic. The project plans mention that it is expected that this area will still be a "very trafficked area" so consideration should be given to maximise the safety of all park users by implementing some form of barrier between pedestrians/park visitors and the busy traffic. This may also result in increased sound pollution to park users from the traffic. Currently, the plans seem to remove those barriers and create a near-seamless environment between Village Green and roads.

The proposals crucially do nothing to disincentivise motorists who descend Chapel Hill and cross Lucan Bridge in order to avoid M50 tolls. A daily car-user commuting from North to South along the M50 could expect to pay over €1,300 per annum, so the savings for "rat running" through Lucan village is very great. This has been repeatedly identified as a major issue (by the local community, including in the 2007 consultation process that resulted in the excellent guidance document "*Lucan / Leamhcán: Village Design Statement (2007) by SDCC / Heritage Council*") that impacts negatively on the quality of life and the environment of the village and surrounding areas, on the free-flow of traffic and use of the village. More use of this 2007 guidance document should have been made in relation to the current proposals overall, as the consultation process was a far more wide-ranging one than recent village consultations in 2021.

Traffic calming measures seem to be largely absent from the current plans, with the potential for more pedestrian and traffic interactions likely if the plans are implemented in their current form. This potential safety aspect should be reassessed.

Crucially, we feel that without a small, dedicated, paid car-park in Lucan village (along the lines of the one off Leixlip Main Street that operates very effectively and smoothly) the continued viability of local businesses, and increased pressure on car-parking spaces, is under threat. SDCC should do everything in their power to acquire a suitable site for a paid car-park as soon as possible, to service both local customers, and the increased tourist footfall expected in the coming years, as plans for Lucan as a destination town are developed. Without such a dedicated, central car-park, the aspirations of a car-free user-base of Lucan visitors is nearly totally aspirational and not practical, and plans to have a thriving village will fail. Lucan, as an area, has been mainly built in a way that necessitates car-ownership for the majority of residents, and the expectation that they will stop using cars to make dedicated, single-purpose visits to Lucan village using public transport or on foot / bicycle is unrealistic.

Another major issue to the success of the plans is that there seems to be no provision for public toilets. These public facilities are desperately needed, (again, identified in the 2007 consultation process) for hygiene and sanitary purposes, even prior to planning an increase in visitor numbers to the village. Currently, parts of the Village Green and Weir areas are frequently used as open-air toilets, which is completely unacceptable from a public health situation. It is unacceptable to expect local cafes to provide access to toilets to non-paying customers, nor do they. The self-cleansing toilet units found in most small towns around Ireland (such as those provided in historic Blessington Town, Co. Wicklow, see image below from Google Streetview) can be designed to minimise impact on the historic streetscape.

There appears to be somewhat of a lack of detail about increased public lighting of the Village Green and Weir areas and provision of vandal-proof, comprehensive CCTV in both areas. Without the provision of both of these aspects, we feel there is the potential for both areas to become unsafe especially after dark, and attract anti-social behaviour and littering.

The removal of so many healthy trees in the Village Green area should be questioned; could these not be retained and incorporated into the design?

Finally, we are concerned with the proposed removal of the section of wall around the Village Green. If the original stonework is not reused (and machine-cut stone is used instead) it will detract from the character of the Griffeen Bridge and whole area. As the 2007 "Lucan / Leamhcán: a Village Design Statement" recommended, the design guidelines for this area should "Conserve the character of the area [...].

We also felt that there are some areas that are missed opportunities in the proposals.

More emphasis generally throughout the proposals should have been put on the feedback from the 2007 consultation process which resulted in the very comprehensive "Lucan /Leamhcán: a village design statement" with specific design guidelines for each part of Lucan village.

The project plans make no mention of heritage signage and information at the Village Green, which is a central point for visitors, and again, was identified as being a design guideline for development by the 2007 report.

No reference to Leamhcán's etymological origins is capitalised on in the plans; namely the disputed "land abounding in mallows" vs. "place of the elms" meaning. Currently, on Logainm.ie (created by The Placenames Branch of The Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media) there is no definitive etymological definition on Leamhcán as a placename, and both potential meanings hold equal weight academically. Surely the planting in the park should incorporate both of these plants, to reflect our local heritage? Both elms and mallows grow wild in the Lucan area, with mallows growing naturally in the graveyard at the medieval Church of the Blessed Virgin in the centre of Lucan village, just off the Village Green.

The Weir Area should refer to the historic name "Long Walk" as this was its name in the 18th century as evidenced on Scalé's historic maps, viewable on SDCC Source.

There appears to be no mention in the plans of cleaning up of the Weir area that is needed (invasive

Himalayan Balm seems to be growing on the banks of the Liffey, and other cleanup needs to be done of trees and detritus washed down the river during floods etc.) and invasive plants (Buddleia) are currently growing and very established on the structure of the Liffey Bridge, that may cause serious damage to the structure. In the 2007 report mentioned above, it mentioned that "Lucan Bridge would benefit from a restoration programme" and yet, there has been no significant improvements to the structure since that time. The report also suggested that "There is an opportunity to enhance Lucan Bridge with appropriate floodlighting."

No mention of small play-spaces for young children, which could be sensitively incorporated into small areas of the Weir Area and/or Village Green, both of which would be very welcome aspects to use of these public areas by all ages of the local community.

Title: Lucan needs more carparking spaces not less

Theme: carparking

I conducted an informal survey of hundreds of residents and businesses in Lucan in November. The removal of car parking spaces was the main concern raised with me (as per the attached report). 78% of respondents stated that parking in Lucan Village is already an issue.

I, like many local residents, want to see the Village Green developed into a more usable space and I

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want to see our footpaths upgraded and made more accessible, in particular for our wheelchair users and buggies, but this needs to be achieved without costing us the vibrancy of our village. Almost half, 49%, of those who replied to my survey were in favour of upgrading Lucan Village Green, but less than half of those remained in favour if it meant sacrificing carparking spaces. Only one in every five respondents wanted the investment in the Village Green if it leads to a reduction of on-street car parking. Less than a third of businesses supported the investment in Lucan Village Green and only 17% were in favour of the proposal if it meant reducing carparking.

From that feedback it is clear that Lucan needs more carparking spaces not less. The proposal to remove 37 parking spaces and the existing accessible parking bays is of huge concern to me as both a local resident and a public representative. I appreciate that the Council has gone to effort to reduce the impact of this by identifying space for up to 26 new parking spaces within walking distance, but the removal of 11 spaces along with the recent removal of parking spaces in Lucan Village, and Leixlip Road, to facilitate Bus Connects stops and parklets, poses a real threat to the vibrancy of Lucan Village and the viability of many of the small businesses in the Village. The removal of parking and accessible bays from outside the medical centre will disproportionately impact older, vulnerable citizens and this must be avoided at all costs.

I think it is very obvious from the volume of feedback given by Lucan residents, businesses and clients of the medical centre that the people of Lucan will not accept the current proposal which they believe will have a negative impact on the village and, in many cases, their ability to access essential services, including medical services or threaten the viability of jobs in small businesses. Therefore, it is my firm belief that in keeping with the spirit of public consultation, a compromise or alternative proposal will need to be found.

The car parking survey carried out during Covid is not a true reflection of the car parking situation in Lucan. The high turn over of the car parking spaces is also really important to note, as it shows that many, many people visit the village staying for a short duration - a quick stop off for coffee, popping in to the convenience store for bread or milk, nipping in to fill a persprtiction, collecting print material, or attending a 30 minute appointment. If parking is not easily accessible these short visits may be seen as much less of a convenient stop off and that could threaten the viability of the shops, service providers and local businesses. This has been clearly articulated by the business community and their customers through this public consultation.

As I have said, Lucan needs more carparking spaces, not less. Some suggestions received in relation to where the Council could seek to develop additional carparking spaces:

- Land behind the Health Centre building
- Lands adjacent to The Square & Hanbury Lane.
- Land along the Lucan Road
- Land at the Italian Embassy (which I accept would be a more expensive option)

Title: Traffic management needs to be at the heart of proposals

Theme: Traffic

Traffic calming measures seem to be largely absent from the current plans which is hugely concerning. Given the fact that Lucan village is a bottleneck during rush hours and used as a rat-run to avoid the M50 I think that any proposals that impact either traffic flow or car parking should be looked at in the context of traffic management. For this reason, I strongly believe that no one-way trials should take place without meaningful consultation with local businesses, residents and public representatives.

Lucan Planning Council have a proposal around minor traffic management changes that could deliver a vehicular decrease of traffic through the village whilst protecting car parking spaces and I do think that options like this should be considered by the Council's Roads Engineers.

Other measures which could ease traffic congestion through Lucan Village:

- Upgrade the right-hand turn from Courtney's to Centra to ease congestion
- Work with Fingal County Council to reconfigure the traffic light sequencing at Lucan Bridge
- Implement a 3-tonne limit at Lucan Bridge to prevent HGVs rat-running over it

There seems to be no concern for the continued destruction of the village amenity for the vast majority of people who live in Lucan by the heavy traffic that this area is subject to. This is traffic using the village to rat run for commuter purposes, very little of this traffic is generating business in the village and should be diverted to the outrageously expensive purpose build M50 and M4. I'm lead to believe that those objecting are doing so out of personal selfishness because of their desire to drive everywhere and avoid the M50 toll. Perhaps SDCC should consider building a drive through GP clinic instead?

Lucan Village has the potential to be a wonderful place to spend time with family and friends. However, it is polluted and noisy and unsafe with drivers often parking illegally on the footpath by the village green and sitting in idling cars. This is not a place you want bring your young family to enjoy a meal or a treat because of the noise and pollution. One has to only look at the incredible market that has grown in St. Catherine's park in the last years. One can see crowds of families of all ages enjoying a green space, spending money and breathing clean air. Many still drive to the park but they have to walk more than 100m to get to the market from the car park, and yet they do in their thousands. An amenity that is accessible all year round that brings people and not cars to the village would be transformative for Lucan.

The proposed works would make this space more open to the public and less hostile. Like St Catherine's park it will be come an attraction rather than a junction for selfish, distracted and aggressive drivers that don't care about our community. It will help the village thrive, it will help reduce anti-social behaviour by eliminating the disconnect from those insulated in their cars not engaging with the community and environment and those who use the green for antisocial purposes.

If anything these plans do not go far enough, I'll take what is on offer, I would personally like to see Lucan Main St pedestrianised from the green north to Ulster Bank on Lower Main St with the removal of all parking. This would create an outdoor space allowing people off all ages to walk safely while traffic is diverted to the significant road infrastructure already in place via Lucan Road, Chapel hill, the N4 and the M50. My main concern with shared spaces is abuse by drivers. I witnesses this in the shared space installed in Exhibition Road in London where many of the museums are located. Drivers continued to speed and park illegally putting everyone at risk. IN the context of the current work I would encourage that enforcement of the law in this be taken seriously by the Gardai.

As a resident of Lucan Village I strongly object to Part 8 of The Proposed Works at Lucan Village Green and Main Street. Firstly it doesn't appear that any consideration about this proposal was made with either residents or businesses in mind.

As residents of the village we have no off-street parking facilities, we already have to pay for a residential parking permit which took nearly two years of fighting with SDCC to obtain. When the pay & display first came into effect in Lucan village SDCC wanted us to park in Sarsfield Park and told us we had no entitlement to park outside or close to our own home. It took us hours upon hours and reams of paper to fight them and eventually secure a residential parking permit. Now we question if this was even worth it as it is difficult, if not impossible to get a parking space during the day in the village and I can't remember the last time we actually managed to get one outside our own home. With the further reduction in spaces proposed it looks like somebody hasn't done their homework properly and using data taken during 20th – 22nd May 2021, and then November and the start of December 2021 is totally unrealistic as we were still in the midst of a pandemic and it would not give an accurate reflection of the parking situation. Their May 2021 study suggests that there is scope to remove 54 car parking spaces from the area with no significant impact on the currant usage. SDCC may not want to hear it but as residents we can honestly say they need to increase not decrease parking spaces in our village. The suggestion that 10 parking spaces could be removed with the hint that further will be removed in the future is totally unrealistic.

As the plan involves the removal of many of the most heavily used parking spaces in Lucan it just doesn't make sense. Parking is already a major problem in the village and to remove even more spaces means we will have more people illegally parking which is already a problem and leaves pedestrians and cyclists very vulnerable. Maybe a survey of the number of people who illegally park in the village and feel it is ok to park in a disability bay, on a double yellow line or at the entrance to private car parks as they are "only running to the bank or the shop for a minute" would be a more productive exercise than the ones undertaken on behalf of SDCC last year that has resulted in skewed data due to the unusual situation of the pandemic.

Are SDCC trying to destroy local businesses and deny local residents access to essential services including medical and other amenities in the village. Lucan is a beautiful village with everything on our doorstep why not let us enjoy it and stop making unnecessary changes. Thousands have already

been spent on the weir and the old plan was never completed. At the time it was promised there would be picnic tables, security cameras etc. but when we enquired why it was never finished we were told they had run out of money. There is obviously money available now why not finish the original plan? The steps already put in at the end of Watery Lane are perfect why change them? Yes the steps and seating area at the bridge end are a beautiful idea and would make a big difference but why spend unnecessary money and change the existing steps?

I feel that parking and traffic congestion are huge issues in Lucan village and the current proposed works and also the suggestion of a one way system are only going to exasperate the problem and have to be totally reconsidered with the residents and businesses in mind not potential tourists. Yes it would be great to have Lucan as a tourism destination but not at the expense of the residents. The CHL survey carried out on behalf of SDCC would probably have got completely different answers if Part 8 of the proposed works and also the leaked proposals for a one way system and the removal of further parking spaces were known to the respondents.

For those in favour of the proposal for the removal of parking spaces because of congestion in the village, logic would suggest that removing these spaces will only cause more congestion as people will be circling the green trying to obtain parking to attend the doctor, go to the post office or run to one of the shops. Please SDCC reconsider your proposal - look at improving the parking situation not aggravating it in our beautiful village & leave our traditional village green alone.

Title: Part 8 Consultation Submission Rationale

Theme: Village Enhancement.

I wish to object to the implementation of the proposed changes to the Main Street and Village Green in Lucan.

The overall effect of this proposal is likely worsen the quality of the daily lives of residents of Lucan rather than improve them.

It is reported in the consultation documents that this proposal arose from an application by SDCC application for funding to Fáilte Ireland under its Destination Towns scheme, in order to develop the tourism potential of Lucan. That application was successful. However, the Council has not indicated how much this project will cost, how much it is likely to receive by way of grant aid from Failte Ireland and how much it will have to fund this out of its own budget.

As stated in the consultation documents, a Tourism Destination Town is one that has sufficient things to do and see, along with supporting services, to keep visitors in a town for a couple of days, thereby enhancing the economic contribution to the local economy.

The proposed changes to the Main Street and Village Green, even when combined the proposals for the Promenade and Demesne Park Entrance, do not meet these criteria. Lucan has not been a tourist destination since the 1800's when the Spa (located near the Spa Hotel) opened. Lucan Village has changed over the years and the population has grown massively in recent times and is still expanding. Most of this expansion is not within walking distance of the village. There has been very little population increase in the village area. There is little or no scope for fundamental redevelopment of the village to make it "Village Centre" in the normal use of that time. It is not and cannot be made into a tourist destination and this is a false base on which to preserve what is best and to optimise the available facilities and heritage. An plan for improvement must be based on local consultations (putting the consultation advert in the Tallaght Echo doesn't show the Council's intentions in that regard in a god light) and how current or future developments can improve the daily living experience of Lucan residents, not tourists.

The architectural heritage report makes it clear that there are little of no historic or heritage sights in this area, with the possible exception of the Italian Embassy which is not part of these proposals.

There are a small number of pubs and restaurants in the Main Street and Village Green area. Because of the absence of any space to develop further in the village it is not possible to add other "tourist" facilities in the immediate area. It is noteworthy that despite the stated intent to attract tourists to this part of Lucan, no effort has been made to provide public toilet facilities for these visitors. There is nothing that would keep tourists in this area for a couple of hours, never mind a couple of days, other than a visit to a pub or restaurant. There are far more restaurants in the Liffey Valley Shopping Centre (a few kilometres way and with plenty of car parking and public transport access) than could even possibly exist in Lucan Village. There is no evidence that, other than during Covid 19, that the various pubs, cafes and restaurants don't have sufficient local visitors. What Lucan Village does not need is further opportunities for anti-social behaviour and uncontrolled outdoor drinking.

In summer, I have often seen tourists who were staying in the Spa Hotel nearby wandering around the Green area, looking for something to see. Changing the Green in the manner proposed might give them a couple of minutes distraction but nothing more!

It is hard not to believe that this proposal is a cynical attempt by the Council to take advantage of Failte Ireland funding and to give the impression that they are doing something about domestic tourism in the Lucan area. If the Council really want to develop facilities and visitor attractions in the Lucan area, it needs to start by consulting with the residents and listening to them. The motivation must not be grants availability or domestic tourism. It must be about facilities for residents of Lucan. If it also helps tourism that should be seen as a bonus not as the primary reason.

Rationale 1

The first rationale for the proposals, in addition to free money, is that street is predominantly weighted towards car use. It allegedly serves primarily as a public carpark and the double line of parking (arguably two-and-a half lines because of the 45° parking on the eastern side) is a deterrent to pedestrian movement across the thoroughfare towards the Griffeen river side. As a result the Green park generally goes unnoticed and there is no amenity incentive to the street.

This is not the day-to-day experience of those of us who live in Lucan. The area is used regularly by walkers and pedestrians generally. The parking is used for short term parking only by people to access shops, medical facilities, banks, Post office etc. Lucan has a very efficient traffic warden service! There is no long-term parking here. The traffic and parking is not a deterrent to pedestrian movement through the area. What is a deterrent is years of neglect by the Council, anti-social behaviour (public drinking etc) – all within metres of a garda station – and the green being used as a camp site by homeless people. These discourage anyone from availing of the Green area and its immediate environs. The Green area could be easily improved without any of the major works of the nature now proposed.

Given the relatively small size of the Green, it would only take a few dozen people to fill it, both now and under the Council's proposals. This raises the question as to why this work is being undertaken on this site when the same funding could probably be better used elsewhere for public facilities in Lucan, especially the newly growing areas.

Rationale 2

The design rationale also suggests that the design intent is to make this end of Main Street a better place for all of its users. This means reducing the number of car journeys and reducing the number of carparking spaces so that more space can be provided for pedestrians and cyclists. The reduced number of car spaces can have a higher turnover by reducing the staying time so that the nett loss in space numbers will be compensated. Additional spaces are being proposed within a minute's walk of the area, as per the wider parking map provided with this submission.

This is a flawed rationale. Lucan Village is centuries old, designed for use in an entirely different era. It cannot now, without major clearance and rebuilding and acquiring additional lands (the Italian Embassy) even begin to be a facility for all possible uses. Thats would not be a very sensible approach. Access to Lucan Village from all directions involves travelling down a relatively steep hill. This is not very suitable for people with mobility issues, parents with children in buggies, cyclists (other than possibly members of cycling clubs). Leaving Lucan Village involves traveling up these same hills.

It is quite evident to anyone in the area during school drop off and collection (there are 5 primary and second level schools in close proximity), that few people walk, most children are collected by parents in cars and there is virtually no-one cycling. But for the availability of car parking in St. Mary's church car park at school times, the traffic mayhem would be much worse. Even in the boys secondary school in Roselawn, there is traffic mayhem in the morning, often at lunchtime and always in the evening with parents collecting 2nd level students. There's a message in this for anyone who wants to hear it.

Whether the Council wishes to acknowledge it or not, Lucan Village is a major traffic artery between the area north of the Liffey (Blanchardstown etc) and areas to the west (Leixlip etc) and east (Clondalkin, Naas Road etc). It can't be wished away! This, together with school traffic, gives rise to major traffic delays each way at many times during the day. This was highlighted by respondents to the Council's surveys last year but totally ignored by the Council planners in designing this scheme. The through traffic may be related to some trying to avoid the M50 tolls but from anecdotal evidence it is more likely because the M50 is already grid locked many evenings and there are few alternative

bridges over the Liffey. The next nearest bridges to Lucan are Leixlip to the west and Chapelizod to the east.

The parallel proposal from the Council to restrict the rest of Main Street up to the Liffey Bridge turn off as one way (to the east) will create even further traffic mayhem. The Council has to accept that a village, designed and laid out many centuries ago, cannot be changed into a walkers and cyclists paradise and that current car and commercial vehicle use can just disappear. Unless there is an alternative route for traffic travelling through Lucan (and I am not aware of any such proposal), then unfortunately, the status quo may be the best option with minor improvements.

As mentioned above, the car parking spaces to be removed are used for short term parking only. Further reducing the time allowed with substantially reduced spaces is not likely to add to the better availability. Relocating some replacement spaces elsewhere will mean more people having to cross roads to get to their destinations. The only thing it will add to is the stress levels of patients in the medical centre worrying about getting a parking ticket if they are delayed! This is a theoretical solution to a real problem.

Replacing some of the parking spaces elsewhere is not a solution. The Council's own parking analysis shows that this is by far the busiest parking area. The proposal to locate 4 spaces outside of the AIB will add to traffic problems as it will prevent traffic heading east, including buses, from moving forward if anyone is turning left into the smaller laned Main Street. In reality these parking spaces can only be accessed by traffic coming from the west as it would be very difficult to access/exit these from the east. The reverse applies to the 4 spaces proposed for the Lucan Road. Making parking more difficult will more than likely mean reduced customer numbers for local business who will use larger shopping areas locally with free parking.

Rational 3

Another part of the rationale for these proposals is that it will encourage more pedestrian interaction with the wider urban environment and will make the street feel safer, particularly for the elderly, small children etc.

As one of the so-called "elderly" I do not believe that this will encourage me to visit the Village Green area and certainly will not make using the village centre "safer". As the vast majority of residents of Lucan do not live within reasonable walking distance of the village centre, it raises the question as to how the will travel there if use of cars is further restricted. Public transport is not an option for most (and is now more limited since Bus Connect) and only those of us who walk for exercise will continue to do so. The notion that Lucan Village Green will become a mecca for families travelling there by bicycle for picnics on the Green is fanciful at best!

Rationale 4

The final rationale stated is that by proposing a shared surface to eliminate kerbs and abrupt changes to levels and surfaces we can make the street more universally accessible, for wheelchair users, for the seeing-impaired and for those of reduced mobility. By providing the same surface for all users, drivers, pedestrians, cyclists and so on, there is a shared sense of responsibility towards safely inhabiting a shared space, where no user group has the upper hand and all have equal status.

This is PR hype at its best. The kerbs can be reduced in a number of ways to facilitate people with mobility issues without being part of a wider development. This has been done in many areas of the country. It is unbelievable that in response to the belief that the pavement to the Dispensary Lane side of the Green is narrow and unsafe in heavy traffic, the solution proposed is to remove the footpath entirely!

To summarise, the proposals for the Main Street and Village Green are based on helping to make Lucan a domestic tourist destination and availing of Failte Ireland grants. This is the wrong basis to start any improvement works in this area. These must be based on the needs of the residents of Lucan, not on mythical tourist traffic, and be part of an overall plan to enhance quality of life for all Lucan Residents, new and old. The current "plan" seems based on the assumption that everything that currently happens in that area will continue but that the enhanced Village Green facilities will bring even more. This is wishful thinking and assumes that the traffic levels in the area will magically disappear and that we'll all travel by foot or bicycle to the village centre. Neither of these are likely to happen.

Theme: Lucan Village

Overview

Lucan is a beautiful heritage village with many positive if under-represented features. When the sun is shining and traffic is light and people are out walking, it is a great example of a suburban village with links to its past still visible. Covid showed us the potential for more people to be out and about and reignited a desire for a more pleasant experience. It needs measures to enhance these desirable

features.

The flipside of this is that, at times, Lucan village has become a traffic-congested kip. Row upon row of cars spewing diesel and petrol pollution, broken occasionally by a thimbleful of EVs and bicycles. Much of this traffic is not aiming to go to the village, but rather through the village and parking spaces at pinch points are at premium for those who visit Lucan to shop, to attend medical appointments, travel to and from their nearby homes, visit relatives, or do other related business. It needs measures to mitigate these undesirable features. The Government needs to be encouraged to abolish or relocate the M50 tolls and, within its remit, the local authority needs to discourage through traffic, enable people who need to access the village to do so and to provide real alternatives to driving without penalising those who have no other option.

Premature plan

While people want to see an attractive and more pedestrian friendly village, with lots of interesting things to see or do, it is telling that the CHL Survey quoted as part of this Part 8 Presentation sees addressing parking and traffic needs as the key issue. However, this plan does not address parking needs, by reducing key parking spaces and does nothing whatsoever to address the crucial traffic congestion issue identified.

As such, the parking element of this plan should have been done after, or worst case, alongside a one-way trial.

It should be frozen pending such a trial, or possibly trialled along with the traffic trial, but it should not go ahead without certainty on future plans. It would be pointless to do so, as any positive impacts cannot be felt until the wider traffic issues are assessed and addressed.

If anything, taking away parking spaces without restricting through traffic will neutralise any attempts to slow down traffic as there will be less vehicles reversing in and out.

The vision of a quieter village and the effect on the area is highly desirable, but would be better assessed after a decent effort is made to manage traffic in the village.

Parking space issues

This plan proposes to take away key parking spaces in the village and replace them with some adjacent spaces, resulting in an estimated overall loss of 11 spaces.

Other submissions have queried the calculations of actual available spaces and suggest that the overall number of spaces in Lucan is less than suggested and that the overall spaces being reduced is more. But even taking the Council proposals at face value, most of the existing parking spaces along the stretch from AIB to Griffeen Bridge will be taken away.

The key question here is a) Can the village do with at least 11 less parking spaces and b) are the ones replacing those along the Main Street stretch of the village green of comparable quality?

I believe the village could indeed take 11 less spaces, even allowing for congestion at peak times or during bad weather. The Council are correct that village parking is not always full, at least not all the time. That said, through close observation as a resident who lives nearby, at least 50% of the time I go into the village walking or in a vehicle between the hours of 10am and 6pm, the area around the village green is usually full. On Friday evenings at around 6pm in particular, it is often impossible to get a spot within a short walk of the village green area as parked vehicles stretch well beyond the Circle K garage. How much more spaces could go is questionable as of now, even if fears of up to 60 spaces being taken away have no factual basis, because the pinch points are pinch points for a reason. And it's not primarily down to laziness.

There is an argument that suggests that a good cohort of drivers living locally could walk instead, or

park further away. I agree that this is the case for some activities and that more of us could and should get off the couches or the car seats. Perhaps the Government should post out a Fitbit or equivalent to every house in Ireland given its positive influence on people maximising their "steps". It might have a positive impact.

But while there are certainly those who could walk further, this is not the situation in every case. There's a lot of credible arguments that driving is essential, or not driving would be a massive inconvenience, in terms of short-term pickups of multiple grocery items, attending the GP or physio, picking up take-aways that need to stay warm. This problem is exacerbated for the area along Main Street being covered under this consultation. Especially when you look at Lucan Village Medical Centre, the pharmacy, the Centra shop and to a lesser but significant extent the banks and other businesses.

The demographics of the village residential area between Ardeen estate and Esker Lane before Woodies shows that there are approximately 6,000 people living here. About 1,200 are over 65 and most of these are living independently and many can walk a fair distance. However, there would be several hundred people of various ages who are not mobile and who need to drive or be dropped to the village. Not every disability is visible. A person with a heart condition or other illness can drive down, walk a little and even look agile, but that doesn't mean they can actually walk very far A healthier lifestyle may help keep people healthier in the future, but you cannot penalise those who are ill for various reasons, nor can moral judgements be made on those who are ill. We have to respect all our citizens and look after the most vulnerable in our society.

These are the people who will be most affected by taking parking away from the location in question. And there is no evidence that the specified spaces being left will be sufficient unless this is trialled first (and in such a case the Council should surely leave more as a starting point).

The arguments around the medical centre are particularly strong. I will not repeat the key arguments made by Dr Lombard and others as they stand in their own right, They are being made on medical considerations not because the business could be accused in any way of fearing less customers. There is a significant shortage of GPs in Lucan right now. And there are no suitable places to relocate to either.

But even in terms of access to the shops, it is worth going into more detail. The Circle K and Maxol garages are close enough to the village anyway but don't offer very large ranges, so it is clear that the only convenience store in Lucan village right now is Centra. Add in the bakery, the butcher and the greengrocer for sure, but the same arguments remain. They are all in the village, down hills.

When I grew up in Lucan you had Toolan's Spar in the village. You had Carey's. You had Fuch's (then McDonald's) on the Lucan Newlands Road beside Cherbury. You had the "Candy Store" and "Murrays" at Esker Lawns. You had Harris's (Corbett's, Keane's) at Beech Park. You had Molloy's and A1 Stores on the Lucan Road. All of these retailers were a walk around the corner. All have now closed; you only have Lynch's Centra remaining.

Therefore, if anyone out of these 6,000 residents wants convenience shopping as opposed to driving further to a shopping centre, they have to go to Centra. And yes, many can walk down for one or two items. People who live in the village itself, estates and individual houses, Esker Lawns, Beech Park, Lucan Heights, maybe Cherbury Park, Beech Grove and Roselawn should be thinking in this regard; it gets to be a push after that from Ballydowd Grove and all the estates in Esker Lane, but I take the points made in some of the submissions.

However not everyone who goes down to the village to shop just picks up a newspaper, or a small carton of milk, or some bread or a bag of apples or a pound of mince. A lot of the shopping would include two litres of milk, a tin of something, a breakfast cereal, toilet rolls, yoghurts, butter/spread. Once it gets bulky or heavy, it's no longer possible to walk any distance with ease. So most people in this situation will desire out of necessity to be within a 120-second walk of the shop, some will need to be less than 60 seconds.

Yes, some shoppers could easily lug lighter bags for longer and should be encouraged to do so.

Some people can park a little bit farther back, but not every shop visit is for a packet of sweets or a sliced pan. Those who want more often have no alternative but to park, or face driving another 10 minutes. Then there are people who are mobile enough, but for whom a walk of 500m or more is too much. Some people are brave enough to cycle, but the Council cannot tell anyone that the current routes to the village are safe for an average cyclist, let alone a beginner one. And again, carrying bulky items is difficult and the hills are a challenge meaning that some people would have to walk back with their bike. Show the safe cycling routes and some of these arguments will be negated. But we don't have them yet. Hence this plan is premature.

From lifestyle and climate change perspectives we need to make Lucan more pedestrian friendly and cycle friendly and create wider footpaths for those in wheelchairs and those wheeling buggies. I want to see the Council being very proactive and visionary in this regard, but you cannot ignore the needs of the people who live in the area; the plan as proposed causes inconvenience without any significant clean, green alternative being provided. You need to put these alternatives in place alongside or beforehand, reduce rat-running traffic, calm existing traffic, create safe cycling spaces, locate off-street parking, create the scene, and make it a pleasant, attractive place rather than force these people to shop elsewhere and reduce traffic by local exodus. This is recipe for removing people from the village, destroying business

And, given the shortage of GPs, you can't force vulnerable people to seek primary medical support elsewhere or have them make a second journey to get medication, currently available next door.

All the above arguments refer to the people living in the village hinterland. Add in the other visitors to Lucan village from outside this immediate residential area and the impact worsens. Because of historic bad planning, which I have fought against all my adult life, the greater Lucan area has become a traffic-congested commuter town, with a dearth of public transport options.

Public transport and cycling incentives needed

The Bus Connects launch has not led to any noticeable improvement in access to the village. In fact, there have been complaints. The people who used the 239 before will use the L51 and L52 and for those who don't have cars, these services will still allow access to the village. There's an argument that says people from further afield visiting the village for a coffee or meal, possibly alongside a visit to a physio, a bank, a psychotherapist etc could get the bus also. I agree wholeheartedly - even if ultra-local fares need to be cheaper - but this cohort is a small subsection. Most of those able-bodied people who would go to the village and who have access to a vehicle would likely have other business after the doctor or physio etc and may need to get back to work, to pick up kids, to go to the supermarket after. If they cannot park in the village, they will not use the village, pure and simple. I wish it were otherwise and that a little nudge will get them out of their vehicles, but we have to strike a balance. We need a living breathing village on the one hand without turning into a "Disneyland" on the other hand, as someone else described it.

There is an element who would cycle more in the village area if safe routes were available. A decent route as part of the Canal Route Project or a link would assist in making more people feel comfortable about cycling to Lucan once it's done right. I've contended that this needs to be through the village rather than a circuitous route through Sarsfield Park that bypasses the village and discourages the recreational and tourism cohort of such cyclists from using the village amenities and spending money in Lucan.

Therefore, such a route needs to be in situ so that people who can and should be more active can see a viable alternative to driving. And, to make this attractive and safer it would be desirable so see off-street parking to compensate for - and possibly enhance - on-street parking that could be put to better use.

However, you cannot remove on-street parking at critical pinch point locations right now, and you cannot remove any at all without providing alternatives.

Off-street parking

It is hard to know where such off-street parking can be located, but here are a few ideas which the Council will not be able to comment on one way or the other due to commercial considerations. And obviously they are mostly privately owned and I respect the right of owners to do what they want with their own property. But perhaps there is a commercial opportunity for some, if the Council was proactive.

With a new Ambassador being appointed, a renewed case needs to be made in terms of the purchase of Lucan House and grounds. It is unfortunate that many years back local traders were offered a parcel of land for car parking but turned down the opportunity to purchase the area. Either way, to the extreme right of the main entrance of the embassy grounds there is a grassed area that is regularly used for parking for visitors to open days and events. If made available to the Council, as an outright purchase of the entire lands or this specific section (with the Italian entrance being recessed), or in lieu of the cost of repair works to the wall opposite the Maxol, or on a leasehold basis, this area could be weatherproofed for parking without damaging any of the mature trees in situ. It would be absolutely necessary for parking here were Lucan house to become a public amenity and destination location, but it would also be hugely advantageous to have such off-street parking in Lucan village.

There is also a large private garden area behind the houses adjacent to Carroll's pub and restaurant. Has anyone been approached about this? While I understand some of the buildings through the gate access may be preserved, making it impossible to access from this route, it might be possible to secure some access via Dispensary Lane or Carroll's Car park. These items need to be examined at least.

Up the east end of the village, a site has been available alongside the purchase of buildings with existing tenants behind Collins's butchers. The area behind is unlikely to ever be granted planning permission for residential development because of the overdrop to the back gardens of Sarsfield Park, but given that there is already an unofficial car park at this location, the entire area could be upgraded, flattened and possibly made multi-storey or underground, subject to a survey.

Vesey Park is grossly under-utilised by the public and the entrance stretch at The Hollow area is primarily grass with the ecological benefit in the tree corridor to the left and the river area to the right. There is scope to put in sensitive car parking at this location for approx 20-30 spaces similar to those at Farmleigh close to the village without damaging the amenity and perhaps enhancing it, especially once the link from the entrance to Vesey Park estate towards the bridge at Cherbury Park is completed. This would require some road reconfiguration, but it would create meaningful parking spaces, which could be free or lower cost than the ones nearer both parts of Main Street in Lucan. It would also enhance the argument for the canal route cycleway to be diverted to the village via Vesey Park.

There are also a small number of diagonal spaces that could be provided near the health centre in Dispensary Lane with a cut into the grassy area before the bollands. Every additional space needs to be considered before taking away other spaces in other areas.

One of more of these locations could help increase quality parking spaces in the village and no argument to reduce spaces further should be made until a comparable quantity/quality is secured.

Dealing with through-traffic and the absolute need for a one-way system trial

SDCC's Chief Executive has worthy visions of Lucan as a "food destination" and the Council wants to push tourism. Our heritage is valuable, so, If it's done properly, we can have the village thriving. Alternatives to cars is a good thing, especially if you're looking to bring more new people to the village. The balance is to make sure you don't take existing users away, still keeping them in cars, but driving further and longer and still spewing out pollutants. We still need to look at a few traffic

management options and ways to make the overall village experience more pleasant.

As someone who has tabled motions calling for a radical approach to dealing with traffic in Lucan it was great to see that a good number of people in the study commissioned by the Council last year suggested that some form of one-way system is required.

This is essential. We know nothing has been worked out yet. But a trial needs to be carried out before this village scheme and it needs input from all stakeholders even as a trial.

The village traders will need reassurance that a temporary trial is just that. Residents near the village need to be able to access their homes. At the same time, we will all need to realise that a trial will be extremely basic and not best practice compared to something well-funded and drawn up to a high standard.

My own unqualified current idea for a permanent system is one way access south from Collins's to Church of Ireland for all vehicles, two-way for bicycles, two-way for buses (using retractable bollards) and two-way for elsewhere (except maybe specified designated times to be determined).

SDCC has outlined a different idea in its tentative drawing suggesting, one way from Courtney's, which to me would cause certain problems.

There's also the issue as to what direction a one-way section for cars would take. The Council appears to be tentatively suggesting that vehicles should head east. However, that means that any cars trying to access the village would have to do a loop around again and this would include a very difficult crunch point to turn right at the top of Chapel Hill.

An alternative would be to make the small one-way section head west. This means that any queuing traffic would largely be on Chapel Hill as opposed to in the village itself. There are arguments that say that increasing the flow at this location to compensate for the added volume on this side would ensure access for residents to estates such as Laraghcon. This would not get rid of traffic over Lucan bridge but would get rid of traffic in Lucan Village.

An alternative is for flows to cause some disruption to residents from one direction, but which would make it easier coming from the opposite direction, an overall neutral effect. This needs to be modelled and, with the proposed cycleway most likely going over the bridge and a clear desire not to destroy the historic vista. Allowing free cycle and pedestrian access, but potentially putting a one-way car traffic light system over the bridge like that up at Confey in Leixlip, would allow flow to be controlled based on the backup towards Woodies at peak evening times or the backup from St Catherine's Park at weekends, for example.

It has also been suggested that a roundabout on the far side of the bridge could be an option, so all engineering solutions need to be examined in detail.

All this needs to be worked out. It must be worked out before tinkering with the parking at the village green. And it's fair to say a trial would be rudimentary and possibly more disruptive, which is why a vision needs to be pushed that has some business and residential buy-in, but which will increase alternative options to cars while not encouraging people who use the village now to drive elsewhere.

It's worth looking at this proactively and positively, even as a trial, because a trial will influence a permanent system going to consultation if it's shown to have met its traffic management aims.

Village Green Works

Wall capping

Some other submissions have pointed out that removing the stone wall and capping will destroy the identity of the village green, open it more to traffic pollution and make it less safe for young children.

The only scenario that this might work with is if traffic is reduced to one way through the village and calmed significantly.

Safety issues

While there are positives to creating access down to the river, there are also safety issues as, with heavier rainfall, the flow will increase, making it dangerous for young children. Clarification needs to be provided regarding what safety precautions will be in place to prevent anyone falling in.

Flood considerations

When the original 2015 bridge plan from the Green to the footpath on the other side near O'Neill's was being considered, engineers highlighted the potential impact in terms of water backing up during a flood scenario. While this risk was found to be minimal, and while the ponds upriver in Griffeen Valley Park will alleviate such risks further, it is also the case that our climate is changing rapidly, and heavy rainfall events will occur more frequently. Any combination of heavy rainfall and insufficient maintenance of waterways could lead to water leaving the Griffeen again and coming into the village from various directions. The impact of water backing up at the bridge beside Weir Interiors needs to be assessed further as taking away walls could lead to more water flooding out in the village.

Trusting these arguments can be considered as part of the consultation.

There is a net loss of 11 car parking spaces and it would appear from the Lucan Village Parking Study (undertaken between November and December 2021 when traffic had largely returned to pre-pandemic levels) that the exisiting parking is actually underutilised within the Village. I must object to the proposal made by South Dublin County Council to build an amphitheatre in the place of Lucan Green on the basis that works will be used to deny entry into Lucan Village via Lucan Bridge and Lower Main Street.

I also object to this plan for its lack transparency.

The "trial-run" to turn Lucan's Main Street into a "one way" "single lane" from N4 Bridge/Adamstown Road/Main Street to Lucan Bridge, will in effect prioritise traffic flow from South Dublin and bordering counties to North Dublin and bordering counties. Higher traffic volume will result in increased localised pollutions levels.

The terminology and meaning of the word "trial" are not defined. SDCC remains vague as to its intentions. The rolling out of a "one-way-system" even on a "trial basis" would require the commissioning of a cost and benefit analysis and the production of an economic impact study. The study would have to be carried by an independent firm.

My perspective as a trader is that the plan by SDCC to introduce a "trial" basis of a "one way street system" will result in job losses and the closure of businesses on Lower Main Street and further into the village. It will also force the migration of businesses located in the village.

The "one way system idea", as proposed, will prioritise "traffic flow" through "Lucan Village" to "Lucan Bridge" to County Meath / North Dublin including areas as remote as Dunboyne, Dunshaughlin and

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Navan.

The one way street system will "cut off" Lower Main Street from the "key economic zones" North of the Liffey accessing the Village via Lucan Bridge and Lower Main Street. Trade from these zones represent 30% to 40% of total receipts to the traders Lower Main Street.

In essence and given the "limited and unquantifiable" reach or benefit of the current plan, what is proposed could have disastrous economic consequences to the village. It also appears that SDCC and Councillors believe that Lucan residents are well serviced in the various "shopping centres" on both side of the River Liffey. This view is discriminatory and objectionable.

What the plan and one way system does not state but appears to imply that "residents Northside of the Liffey, Laraghcon, Westmanstown or Strawberry beds should take their patronage to Liffey Valley Shopping Centre or Blanchardstown Shopping Centre.

Blocking entry to these residents via Lower Main Street is to frustrate or deny direct access to Main Street retailers or Supervalu Shopping Centre will add 2.1km journey for shoppers. SDCC and Councillors also appear not to grasp the positive impact that businesses and services have in Lucan Village. Patrons make it known when visiting the village that they do so because it is a village and they like the "feel of it" and stress that "we are lucky" because we have a village. They visit the village because it is well serviced with a good product mix including retail and on trade. They also are looking forward to the opening of new outlets.

Lucan Bridge is used by commuters from County Meath from 5.30am each morning until 7.30am and from 3.30pm until 7.30pm in the evening to buy-pass the M50. The "one-way" traffic corridor will "promote" a more "direct route" through Lucan Village. The N4/Adamstown Road Bridge is where the distance is "shortest" to Lucan Bridge. The distance between Supervalu/Adamstown N4 exit to Lucan Bridge is of just 1.3km (current delays 25minutes at peak hours) compared to 1.8km from the Ballydowd exit Chapel Street to Lucan Bridge (current delays up to 45minutes at peak hours).

At peak time a 2.6km trip from Lower Main Street / Lucan Bridge via Adamstown Road to the Rainbows End Creche & Playschool, 17a The Glebe, Esker Manor, Glebe, Lucan, Co. Dublin, K78 X992 takes just 7 minutes while the journey back takes an average of 25 minutes. Access from Lower Main Street is therefore advantageous for the trade as traffic flow is not obstructive and access easier.

Another reason for objecting to the proposed plan is that neither South Dublin County Council and County Councillors have been able to demonstrate that their plans will "improve life in Lucan Village". SDCC admits that Lucan is not a "destination" town as it lacks all the attributes it requires to be one!

The SDCC plan promoted by councillors from opposition, independent and Government parties alike is at best an "approximation" of a plan with the intention of turning a town recognized has having none of the tourist infrastructure required such as hotels beds and B&B and none of the "product mix" required to be considered a destination town. Yet, SDCC and councillors believe, after years of neglecting the vary basic up-keep of the village, that it is imperative and right to risk the jobs of many to prove that a town that could not be considered a "destination location" will be considered "worthy of it" for the purpose of a plan lacking balance, ideas and vision. This plan was drafted, it would seem, with in mind, the stated intentions of limiting access by taking parking facilities away, while imposing and encouraging traffic through it by opening a "one way street traffic corridor". Both ideas are contradictory.

Having organized events and lodged visitors in Lucan, it is a near impossible task to lodge overseas visitors in the village.

Examples used by the promoters bear no correlation with reality and are at best fantasist. No application for funding would be accepted if such a proposal was put to Government. The town of Malahide is used misleadingly by SDCC and Councillors as an example. Malahide is a destination town: it has a castle, a Marina, beaches, hosts concerts and has hotels, B&Bs and restaurants while Lucan Village seats at the bottom of a steep and is sandwiched between sprawling housing estates

and is used a "traffic corridor for residents living or working in the counties of Meath/Louth/Kildare/Wicklow and Dublin. It is the failure of successive Governments, County Councillors, SDCC and Fingal County Council to act that makes the SDCC proposal objectionable.

The vast majority of Lucan residents live outside the original village boundaries. These residents live 0.8km to 1.8km to the village centre on elevated sites and in new developments further afield between the N4 line.

Lucan and surroundings are not serviced by a "light public transport system geared for local access" instead the current transport system is cumbersome and obstructive.

The neglectful absence of a "light, frequent public transport" services to facilitate access into the village is a stumbling block to the elderly and people with disabilities, children and families with young children, not traffic. To expect older people or wheelchair users living in Beech Park, Beech Grove, Chalet Gardens, Ardeevin, Roselawn not to mention Dodsboro, Admanstdown, Finnstown, etc. access the village and all its parts is evidence of a disconnect between the planners stated ambitions and the likely results given the challenging geographical environment, the sheer scale of the area covered and combined with the complete absence of light public transport services.

Lucan Village is a working town accessed by Lucan and bordering residents during week days and weekends wishing to shop in a village and engage one on one with traders or other visitors doing likewise, have a coffee, lunch or a drink with friends. Outside visitors to Lucan to the village because of its traders and the convivial village atmosphere. Visitors have stated that "we are lucky to have a village". They say that "one meets real people". This, also makes the SDCC plans along with the arguments voiced by councillors promoting the plan objectionable as it denies the human and social aspects provided by the working people of Lucan Village to visitors.

Traders are also providing valuable employment to young local adults/college students as well as parents.

A testament to Lucan traders during the pandemic was to provide instantly a delivery services to local and not so local residents from small parcels or single items deliveries. No one was left out from the elderly, handicapped, people with underlying health issues, etc.

What Lucan Village is not is a "destination town". At just 21 minutes of Dublin City Centre, Lucan must compete with the best Dublin City Centre can offer, or just a few minutes away with top tourist destinations such as Farmleigh, Dublin Zoo, or Castletown House and Parkland in Kildare.

Had SDCC proposed to create on a trial basis a "one way system" from Lucan Bridge into the Village Green and facilitate local access into the Green to resident, it would have desmonstrated that it was attempting to frustrate traffic using Lucan Village as a by-pass to the tolls, saving by doing so €1,000 to €2,500 per annum, by prioritising access to the "local, bordering communities and those who work in the village" and support the local economy.

- 2). The proposals inculde the destruction of walls which are a historic part of the village and can be seen in images of Lucan main street going back decades.
- 3). Close proximity parking is required for patients of the Main Street Clinic, this must not be removed or curtailed in any way. Removal of these spaces and reduction of the overall number of spaces will have an negative impact on the business around the village green.
- 4). There has been bad planning in the Lucan area over the decades. There has been over-development of housing without the necessary improvement in road infrastructure- particularly the impact of the Laracon estates on traffic through "old Lucan" and the village. There are large traffic build ups at numerous junctions in and around that will bear the brunt of the plans proposed for the village green area. While I broadly welcome the opportunity to invest in our village, I don't believe it should be at any cost. Being from Lucan, living in Lucan, and a frequent user of the village, I believe the plan does not favour local businesses and vulnerable residents for ease of access in our community. Daily tasks such as visits to the GP surgery, Mental Health support services, the bank, religious venues and other various local businesses. I would ask engineers to re examine alternative options for parking, that will be all emcompassing of the amition of the plan.

- An informal survey of hundreds of residents and businesses in Lucan in November found that
 the removal of car parking spaces was the main concern with 78% of respondents saying
 parking in Lucan Village is already an issue.
- Updates to make the Village Green a more usable space must not come at a cost to the vibrancy of the village
- The removal of parking and accessible bays from outside the medical centre will disproportionately impact older, vulnerable citizens and this must be avoided at all costs.

Could we explore age friendly parking? We worked hard previously to enhance our village with additional accessible parking, and this is now at risk. I have strong concerns of the impact of this.

- The car parking survey carried out during Covid is not a true reflection of the car parking situation in Lucan. I would request an updated survey be carried out now that restrictions are lifted. It would be more reflective of daily life through the village.
- The high turnover of the car parking spaces is also really important to note, as it shows that many, many people visit the village staying for a short duration

Lucan deserves investment and enhancement, but done correctly, not with the loss of access in our community and local businesses.
