LED upgrade programme con-

To date, the Council has upgraded 17,500 (SOX) public lights to LED throughout the County but about 8,000 of these SOX public lights remain. These 8,000 lights are some of the trickiest to upgrade as they are old and are not compliant with current regulations.

Resolving this issue with ESBN has been slow and has impacted on our upgrade programme. Working with ESBN and the CR, in January 2023 we signed an agreement on how we can jointly address the technical and safety issues presented by these lights.

We are now able to move forward again in conjunction with ESBN. To test our agreed new way of working with the ESBN, we have agreed to progress upgrades in three estates across the County. These three pilot estates include works to Rathfarnham Wood, which is due to commence in April, and at Redwood Kilnamanagh and at Ashwood Clondalkin, both of which will follow in due course. Once these works are completed, we will understand all the likely issues and based on that information we will be able to agree a more ambitious upgrade programme with the ESBN.



South Dublin County Council Active Travel secures new Bike Library

South Dublin County Council Active Travel Unit has been successful in their application for a Bike Library to be run out of two large primary schools in Templeogue, Bishop Galvin and Bishop Shanahan in late 2023.

Both schools are part of the Safe Routes to School programme which encourages parents with their children to cycle to school safely reducing car congestion and creating a safe, healthier environment for everyone. Funded by the NTA & Active Travel at SDCC, families can borrow either an e-bike, cargo bike or foldable bike for a set period during the school term at no charge.

This programme was initially piloted successfully in Harolds Cross which had significant congestion issues, with parents positively transitioning to the bike library from their cars.

Informal public consultation on a new Active Travel scheme from Tallaght to Knocklyon to start in April

The Cycle South Dublin programme identifies the 'Tallaght to Knocklyon' scheme as a key element in delivering a safe and connected cycle network across the County. This route would link the communities of Old Bawn, Firhouse, Knocklyon, and Ballyboden.

The scheme will allow people of all ages and abilities to incorporate healthier, more sustainable travel choices into their daily lives.

The route will connect into other active travel projects already being progressed in the area including the D24 Neighbourhood Cycle Network, Dodder Greenway, Avonbeg, Wellington Lane. An essential component of the scheme will be linking high quality routes with key trip generators, such as schools, workplaces, community facilities, and residential areas.

Phase 1 of the project will be progressed under Section 38 powers and will transform the streetscape of Old Bawn Road and Knocklyon Road as well as focussed interventions on Firhouse Road which will eliminate weak points from the, mostly high-quality, existing walking, cycling and public transport facilities.

There have been several discussions on the scheme to date with local Cllrs, schools and businesses in the area over the last year to help inform the design. We are now ready to launch a four-week non-statutory public consultation in April giving residents, businesses, community organisations and people from all walks of life a further opportunity to shape the design and delivery of this important project.



Informal engagement with the local community begins in Clondalkin to support to the preparation of the Clondalkin Local Area Plan

The early stages in the preparation of a Local Area Plan (LAP) for Clondalkin has commenced. As part of this preparation, a consultation strategy has been drawn up to reach out to as wide an audience as possible. The consultation will help to feed into a draft vision for Clondalkin quiding the early preparation of the LAP. The first phase of the consultation will be a survey which went live on 27th March and will be open to the public for a three-week period. This will allow those interested to give their views on Clondalkin, what it is like to live in and visit, the things that are good about it and where people see opportunities to improve.

Over the course of April and May there will be further opportunity to engage with the Council through face-to-face workshops and webinar sessions, including specific sessions for youth and for disabled persons. Later in the year, further consultation events will be held to provide feedback to the public on progress. Details of exact dates and venues for the different events will be publicised in due course.

New Family Hub Opens in Clondalkin

The Council, in collaboration with Peter McVerry Trust, has opened a new family hub in Clondalkin. We, along with the other Dublin Local Authorities and the Dublin Regional Homeless Executive are responding to significant additional demand for supported family accommodation across the Dublin region, and this new facility will be an important addition to the options available for families, particularly those with connections in the Clondalkin area.

Family hubs offer stability to families while they pursue longer term accommodation through HAP supported private rented accommodation, with the help of on-site key workers, or social housing tenancies.

The new family hub meets a long-standing objective of providing supported emergency accommodation in the Clondalkin area and will accommodate up to ten families that are currently staying in hotels or B&Bs.

The facility includes a play space for children as well as cooking and laundry facilities and communal recreational space.



Sports Partnership Rowing Programme

In a March of many weathers the local Sports Partnership Schools Indoor Rowing programme was extended with the addition of outdoor water sessions.

Students from Collinstown Community College, St Aidan's Community School, Coláiste de híde, St Paul's Greenhills and Coláiste Bride all took to the water, transferring the skills and learning from their indoor training programmes onto local waterways.

More local schools are set to take to the water in the coming months all cumulating in a Grand Canal Dock Blitz event on 4th May.

Sod Turned on New Housing and Community Facility Development in Balgaddy


On Thursday 30th March 2023, Mayor Emma Murphy officially turned the sod to commence the development of 69 new social homes and a new community centre in Balgaddy, Lucan.

The Mayor was accompanied at the event by the Council's Chief Executive, Daniel Mc Loughlin along with local Councillors and Council staff as well as representatives from Cunningham Contracts, who are the appointed contractor for the project.

The development is located between Tor an Rí Walk and Foxborough Lawn and will see a mix of one, two and three-bedroom homes delivered across various typologies including two-storey houses, duplexes and apartments.

These new social homes form part of our housing construction programme under the Council's Housing Delivery Action Plan 2022-2026 and are being funded by the Department of Housing Local Government and Heritage through the Social Housing Investment Programme under the national Housing for All policy while the community centre is being delivered by the Council through its capital programme.

The overall development is expected to be fully completed by mid-2024.



New Affordable Homes Being Launched in Kilcarbery

This month will see the next phase of 29 affordable homes being made available for purchase in the Kilcarbery housing development. This joint venture between the Council and local development consortium, Adwood Ltd. will deliver over 1,000 social, affordable, cost rental and private homes by 2025.

The affordable homes, which will be ready from summer 2023 are supported by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage's Affordable Housing Fund under the national Housing for All policy.

Indicative prices range from approximately €265,000 to €330,000 depending on the size/type of the property and the eligible applicants' purchasing power'. Homes will be allocated to eligible applicants in accordance with the Council's Scheme of Priority for Affordable Dwelling Purchase Arrangements.

LEO Student Enterprise Programme

Local Enterprise Office South Dublin have announced that teenage entrepreneurs from the South Dublin area will represent South Dublin at this year's Student Enterprise Programme National Finals on Friday 5th May. The Finals make a return to Croke Park for the first time since 2019.

Mobile Libraries Take Part in St. Patrick's Day Parades

South Dublin County Council's Mobile Libraries took part in the St. Patrick's Day Parades in Lucan and Clondalkin this year with the aim of promoting the Mobiles service, and the library service as a whole. The parades were very well attended and supported locally, and the Libraries Team were delighted to play a part, and with the really positive reaction that the Mobiles received.

The Mobile Library service visits 36 public stops each week, as well as visits to primary schools each week during term time. The Library@Home service continues to deliver books to over 100 vulnerable people on a monthly basis in the com munity and they also facilitate regular outreach events to nursing homes, secondary schools, special education centres and the refugee reception centre at Citywest.

Clondalkin Sculptures

South Dublin County Council have announced the commissioning of two new compelling and highly visible artworks that connect thematically with the heritage of Clondalkin.

The artworks which will contribute to a strong and unique sense of place are funded by South Dublin County Council, the NRA as part of the Monastery Road Improvement Scheme, and the Department of Housing, Heritage under the Per Cent For Art Scheme.

Following a community consultation, artists were invited to submit proposals. As a result, An Chluain by artist Holgar Lonze was selected for a site adjacent to the Woodford Roundabout, Monastery Road, Clondalkin.

A second artwork, Origami Monk - The Monk of Clondalkin by artist Ngaire Jackson, identified through the same competition has also been commissioned and will be located at the junction of New Nangor Road and 9th Lock Road, close to the site of former Clondalkin Paper Mill. This 3.5m tall artwork is due to be installed in September 2023.

Increased ambition for Climate Action by South Dublin **County Council**

In 2019 the Dublin Local Authorities published what were the first Local Authority Climate Change Action Plans (CCAP) in the country. The SDCC Plan set out 6 action areas with 154 actions that the Council would undertake in the areas of energy & buildings, transport, flood resilience, nature-based solutions, resource management and citizen engagement.


The policy and legislative context relating to climate action has developed since the publication of the Council's CCAP; the publication of the **National** Climate Action Plan 2023 seeks to put Ireland on a more sustainable path, cutting emissions, creating a cleaner, greener economy and society, and protecting the country from the consequences of climate change.

Under the Climate Action and Low Carbon Development (Amendment) Act 2021, the Minister has instructed Local Authorities to prepare a Climate Action Plan for 2024 to 2029 by the 24th of February 2024, and we are initiating the statutory plan making phase now.

The IPCC Sixth Assessment Report (AR6) summarises the state of knowledge of climate change, its widespread impacts and risks, and climate change mitigation and adaptation. Changes in annual global surface temperatures are presented as 'climate stripes', with future projections showing the human-caused long-term trends.

We want all citizens of South Dublin to input to this improved Plan. A public consultation process will be launched in September 2023; and this will be an opportunity to get involved and shape the Plan.

Social Credits Scheme

South Dublin County Council's Social Credits Scheme rewards communities who take positive sustainable action to improve their local area. Over the last four years almost 200 new applications were received from residents' associations, schools, volunteer and environmental groups throughout South Dublin.

The Social Credits Scheme currently incorporates three programmes

- Paint Enhancement Scheme provides groups with up to 60 litres of paint and equipment to carry out minor enhancement projects in their area including the removal of graffiti.
- Minor Landscaping Scheme provides a site assessment by a horticulturist (if required), equipment, plants and bulbs to groups to carry out minor enhancement projects in their area.
- Clean up materials Groups who sign up are provided with bags, hi-vis vests, gloves

and litter pickers. The Council know will arrange for the collection of bags.



Bringing Vacant Homes Back in to Use

Vacant Homes Action Plan



nder the national Vacant Homes Action Plan, funding of €150 million is available from central government to local authorities for projects to activate vacant properties and derelict sites. Together with the creation of a dedicated new Vacant Homes Officer position, the Council has a range of supports available to assist with buying, leasing or selling a vacant property as follows:

Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant

The Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant is available to first-time buyers or "fresh start"* buyers. The grant is worth up to €30,000 to buyers of properties that have been vacant for at least two years. This is subject to upper limits for different types of work, having regard to a reasonable cost assessment by the local authority.

(*You are a 'fresh start' applicant if you previously owned a home, but you no longer have a financial interest in it because: you are now divorced, separated, or your relationship has ended, and/or you have gone through personal insolvency or bankruptcy.)

Derelict Property Top-up Grant

In addition to the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant, if the property you are buying is derelict you may qualify for a top-up grant of up to €20,000.

Repair and Lease Scheme

This scheme assists owners of vacant residential properties with the cost of improvement works. The property must be vacant for at least one year and there must be a social housing demand for property in the area. The maximum funding allowable is €60,000 per unit to tackle vacancy. The minimum lease term is 5 years, and the maximum is 25 years depending on the cost of the works.

Buy and Renew Scheme

Register a Vacant Home

The Buy and Renew Scheme supports local authorities in purchasing and renewing housing units in need of repair and making them available for social housing use, where the Council determines its suitability for social housing. It aims to help tackle the problem of dereliction and to improve an area's appearance. As a complementary initiative to the Repair and Leasing Scheme, it provides the option for suitable properties to be purchased rather than leased, if that is the property owner's preference.

Although South Dublin County Council currently has the lowest vacancy rate in the country at 1.4% of properties, with Tallaght Central the electoral area e=with the lowest rate of vacancy nationally at 0.7%, we still want to know if you are aware of a property vacant in your local area so we can explore the best way to bring it back into use. If you are aware of an empty/vacant private home in your area, please register the property at www.vacanthomes.ie. Any vacant homes identified, will be investigated by the Vacant Homes Officer to examine the possible options to bring this property back into occu-

While also offering educational foraging walks to help people understand the beauty of our native Irish plants, Forager picked up the Green Business Award. With the expansion and divirsity of new businesses starting up in the county, the Food / Drink sector is always a very strong category in South Dublin. This year the Award went to Aisling Tuck of Oh Happy, which produces plant based baked goods, and Naked Bakes which is bake at home plant-based cookie dough.

The 'NEWS' / Women in Business Award went to Eimear Fahy for Accessories4babies, which specialises in high quality eco friendly weaning products. While the inaugural SCENE (Creative Economy) award went to Audrey Corrigan of Aud Design for her jewellery company, which uses precious and semi precious metals and stones.

All of the Award-winning businesses are supported by the Local Enterprise Office South Dublin and will share a €14,000 investment fund. The Overall winner High Res Lighting will go on to represent South Dublin in the National Enterprise Awards later this year.








Ireland 2040 Climate Action Fund, SEAI and through direct funding from SDCC. In the Governments Climate Action Plan 2023, the increased ambition is that Ireland will reach up to 0.8 TWh of district heating by 2025 and up to 2.7 TWh by 2030.

Speaking at the Official Opening, Minister Ryan said; "This is a leading example of how energy that would be otherwise be wasted is now being used to heat local public buildings, a university and people's homes, and I know that there are plans to go beyond this in time. It's also a working demonstration of smart private-public partnership and an indication of the transformative role that district heating can play in our new more energy efficient and decarbonised energy mix. In our Climate Action Plan 2023, we have set out our increased ambition for district heating. I anticipate that our district heating steering group will shortly publish its recommendations on how we can reach these targets, led by our local authorities and facilitated with private sector involvement as is the case here in Tallaght."



Councillor Emma Murphy, Mayor of South Dublin County Council said; "It gives me great pleasure to be here for the official opening of such an innovative project in South Dublin. Through the delivery of a project of this scale and ambition, South Dub-

lin County Council are truly leading the way when it comes to climate change innovation and sustainability in Ireland, which citizens in the county can be incredibly proud of. We look forward to seeing the next step come to fruition, when the district heating network will provide sustainable heating to new homes in the Tallaght area."

Mike Beary, AWS Country Lead said: "AWS has been investing in Tallaght for 15 years now and we are proud to be a part of the community. We love the ambition and spirit of innovation that this first-in-the-nation project embodies. HeatWorks will benefit our neighbours for years to come and help the country meet its 2030 renewable energy targets."

Minister Eamon Ryan officially opened Tallaght District Heating Network and Energy Centre - Ireland's first publicly owned, not-for-profit energy company.

Minister for the Environment, Climate & Communications and Transport, Eamon Ryan TD and the Mayor of South Dublin County, Councillor Emma Murphy, officially opened South Dublin County Council's (SDCC) Tallaght District Heating Network at the Heatworks Energy Centre in Tallaght.

Trading as Heatworks, Ireland's first publicly owned, not-for-profit energy company, is now providing low-carbon heat to public buildings in the area. The development of this innovative, low-carbon initiative has been led by SDCC with the assistance of its energy agency, Codema.

The network initially will provide heat to 32,800m2 of public buildings. Customers of Heatworks include SDCC and Technological University Dublin (TU Dublin). Buildings heated by this project include County Hall, Tallaght County Library, the SDCC Innovation Centre- Work IQ, and 133 affordable apartments, which will connect in early 2025. The university buildings include the Main Building, the Sports-Science, Health and Recreation Building, followed by the new Catering

College (CAET), to be completed in 2024.

The network uses excess heat from Amazon Web Services' (AWS) data centre to provide low carbon heat to the network customers. AWS has included heat-collection systems in their new facility which provides this recycled heat at no cost as part of its broader sustainability commitments. HeatWorks will assist Ireland in meeting its EU 2030 national heating and carbon-reduction targets. It is estimated that in this first phase of delivery, the carbon emissions reduction in the Tallaght area will be over 1,500 tonnes per year.

Heatworks contracted Fortum, a large Finnish energy company with extensive district-heating experience throughout Scandi-

navia and Eastern Europe, to carry out the design, construction, operation and maintenance of the Tallaght District Heating Network.

South Dublin County Council initiated this pilot project, to exemplify the environmental value and potential of District Heating in Ireland. The collaboration between SDCC, AWS engineering teams, Fortum, and the Dublin energy agency Codema has resulted in a low-carbon solution, optimising the potential of recyclable heat combined with innovative heat-pump technology – the first example of its kind in Ireland.

The Tallaght District Heating Network was partly funded by the European Union's Interreg NWE programme (Heatnet), Project


