The report also highlights major news pieces and puts a focus on an area of the Council that doesn't always get the attention it deserves.

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
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St. Luke's Church of Ireland, Peamount Hospital, Historic Structure Project

St. Luke's Church at Peamount Hospital was the former Church of Ireland Church. The timber framed corrugated iron clad church was constructed in 1913 to serve patients and staff of the Sanatorium.

The Historic Structures Fund (HSF) is one of the grant Schemes that the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage fund, and is focussed on restoring historic structures and buildings for the benefit of communities and the public. In addition, refurbishment or reuse projects share a clear residential or community benefit.

Through the HSF the Council secured €50,000 under Stream 1 of the Scheme for essential repairs and smaller capital works for the refurbishment and conservation of Protected Structures. St Luke's Church has been in use as a hospital archive storage space in recent years.

The cladding and structure had deteriorat-

ed with extensive rust on the roof sheets. gutters were missing and vegetation had penetrated the structure at the north gable. Funding from the Historic Structures Fund 2022 has allowed the necessary funding and support for essential repair and conservation of the structure for long-term use.

The works under Phase One were carried out under HSF 2022 and included, external repairs to walls, roof structure, structural interventions and repairs to the original corrugated iron roof and wall sheeting and upgrading and repairs of windows and

Energy upgrading measures to provide insulation to the walls and roof were also carried out. Repair to the original corrugated iron sheeting roof and walls were carried out by specialist conservation contractor which included a paint analysis to identify the original paint colour for repainting of

roof and wall corrugated sheets.

External works were completed during 2022 and Phase 2 works have now commenced. Peamount Hospital were successful under HSF 2023 securing further grant funding

of €40,000 to complete Phase 2 works which includes interior repairs and energy efficiency upgrading works, which will allow the building to be adaptively reused as part of a staff training facility within the hospital complex

Traffic Calming Schemes 2023 The Council's transport team intend to

deliver several Traffic Speed Calming Schemes across the County during 2023. These schemes will include several types of vehicle speed control measures, such as; junction radii tightening, the installation of chicanes, new central islands, road width reduction build outs, additional signing and lining, raised tables and ramps. The purpose of all these measures are to slow vehicle speeds to create a safer environment for all road users. There will be a consultation process undertaken for each proposal consisting of the following:

1. Electoral Area workshops with local Councillors to decide the proposed traffic calming options to go to public consultation. 2. Conduct a Section 38 process under Roads Act 1994, whereby, the proposed list of interventions will be advertised in the prescribed manner in the Act and on the SDCC consultation portal. In this process submissions from the public will be sought

3. The schemes with the most public support will be constructed by the end of 2023.

Transition year students from schools in Tallaght and Clondalkin and members of Comhairle na nÓg recently took part in a series of poverty consultations. Young people provided insight into what they felt was going well in their communities and offered solutions to a variety of concerns. Key recommendations were offered on several themes, including housing, healthcare, education, community services and community safety. The feedback collated from these consultations will ensure that young people's feedback and experiences will contribute to the development of the Local Economic and Community Plan.

Increases in Housing Adaptation Grants for older and disabled people

South Dublin County Council is delighted to be allocated €3,792,515 in funding for Housing Adaptation Grants for Older and Disabled people for 2023, which is a €221,075 (6.2%) increase on their 2022 allocation

Grants of up to €30,000 are available to assist disabled people in carrying out necessary works to make a dwelling more suitable for their needs under the Housing Adaption Grant Scheme (HAG Scheme). Additionally, grants of up to €8,000 are available to assist older people to have necessary repairs or improvements carried out on their homes under the Housing Aids for Older Persons Scheme (HOP Scheme). Under the Mobility Aid Scheme, which assists with grant aid to cover a basic suite of works to address mobility problems, primarily, but not exclusively, associated with ageing, grants of up to €6,000 are available.

In addition to administering the Housing Grants Scheme in 2023, South Dublin County Council are committed to bring Housing Adaptation Grants for Older People and People with A Disability Schemes online in the coming months. This is in line with our Digital Transformation Project, aimed at providing the best possible service to our citizens. This added platform will facilitate applicants who may wish to submit their application on-line, with the benefits of applying digitally in their own time from their homes or hospital / care facility, and also reducing printed paperwork and making best use of staff resources.

Projects to be funded under the Community Recognition Fund

Community Recognition Fund

The Government have announced €50 million in funding for over 880 projects as part of the first-ever Community Recognition Fund.

This is a major initiative designed to support and reward communities that have welcomed families and citizens from Ukraine and other countries and to recognise the efforts of communities who have gone above and beyond to support new arrivals across the Country.

South Dublin County Council have received €2,654,305 for 19 projects across the county, which were supported and submitted by the Community Department. Projects such as new sporting facilities, playgrounds and provision of free Wi-Fi access points will be delivered directly to the communities and will be for the benefit all residents.



Student Enterprise Programme

South Dublin were represented across three categories, Junior, Intermediate and Senior, at this year's Student Enterprise Programme National Finals. The Students were all in attendance on the day exhibiting their businesses which were judged by a team of national businesses experts and mentors. Each student enterprise was challenged with creating, setting up and running their own business, which must show sales of their service or product. The judging panel included business owners and representatives from enterprise agencies and associated bodies.

The Finals of the Local Enterprise Office initiative took place on Friday in Croke Park.

In the Junior Category, the students from The Simple Things Made So Simple at St. Mark's Community School. In the Intermediate Category, Daniel's Cookies from Greenhills Community School represented the county at the Finals.

Lucan House

South Dublin County Council has reached agreement in principle to purchase Lucan House and accompanying lands of 30 acres from the Italian government. Lucan House has been owned by the Italian Government and used as a diplomatic residence since the early 1950's. The history of the Demesne which dates back to 1560, is noted for its links to General Patrick Sarsfield, who was born in the original castle on the grounds and is immortalised by a sculpture in his memory on the grounds designed by James Wyatt.

The house itself, described as a pure Palladian villa, was built in 1772 by Agmondisham Vesey, in conjunction with William Chambers. The purchase is a strategic investment in the history, heritage, and amenity value of the property. It is expected that the formal conveyancing will take a number of months.

At the recent Irish Construction Excellence Awards 2023, the Grange Castle West Access Road project won the Judges Silver Award in the Civil Engineering projects category. This prestigious award rightly recognises the delivery of this project during the difficult covid and Brexit periods which impacted in so many ways.

Contractors Clonmel Enterprises who constructed the project on behalf of South Dublin County Council were delighted with the award, with the €13m investment by the Council in the access road opening up 500 acres of strategically important land, with the potential to provide for up to 10,000 jobs. South Dublin County Council Staff Information & Consultation Forum

Staff Smoking Cessation Programme

The Council supported a 6-week Smoking Cessation Programme for staff at SDCC during February and March 2023.

The programme was open to staff who wanted support to quit smoking and was a structured behavioural programme delivered by HSE healthcare professionals with weekly group check ins.

The success rate has been very encouraging to-date with participants highly recommending the programme.

Numbers of participants are limited in each group and such is the success of the initiative, there is currently a waitlist for a further programme.





Fast Fashion Documentary

Since the mid-2000s fast fashion has changed the fashion industry. Where traditional two collections were produced every year once, today fashion companies produce 50-100 micro-seasons annually. Consumers have, so far, embraced this throw away culture, but do we really know what impact this is having on our world.

South Dublin County Council together with the other Dublin Local Authorities and the Eastern Midlands Regional Waste Office are developing a documentary to highlight the issues around fast fashion. Fast Fashion: The Reality, the Impact, and the Solution is a short 20-minute documentary

aimed at the men and women of all ages who buy fast

The documentary gives a uniquely Irish perspective and includes contributions from Carrie Ann Moran, Circular Fashion Ireland Consultant and Arran Murphy, Rediscover Fashion Programme Manager at the Rediscovery

The complicated supply chains in the globalised fashion industry has resulted in poor environmental practices at every stage and means that the industry is now a significant contributor to climate change.

The documentary is due to be released over the summer 2023.



Mayor opens new Playspace at Dodder Valley Park Old Bawn

The Mayor of South Dublin County Council, Cllr. Emma Murphy officially opened the new Playspace at Old Bawn, Dodder Valley Park on Thursday 25th May 2023.

The Mayor was joined by local Councillors, staff of South Dublin County Council, and guests to celebrate this event.

Speaking at the event Mayor Cllr. Emma Murphy said: "Play is recognised as a vital activity for healthy child development. Children also need time in nature for their physical and mental wellbeing. Integrating a playspace into this well used park has brought more life into it right throughout the day."

The playspace was delivered via SDCC's capital budget and is the first of three new playspaces for Dodder Valley Park, as well as the interconnecting play trail.

The playspace at Old Bawn also incorporates a toddler specific playground, which was chosen and voted for by members of the local community, through the 300k Have Your Say Public Participatory Budget process.

Kompan Ireland and focuses on the play needs of all children and has a specific area for toddlers and younger children. The playspace consists of two flat swings, two cradle swings, a basket swing, a balance trail, a wobble belt bridge, a slide, and a sand play area.

Water Safety Innovation

More than 90 sensors have been installed across South Dublin County Council's rivers and lakes to alert line managers when ring buoys are tam- connected to the monitoring system. pered with or go missing.

In 2020 Smart Dublin in partnership the four Dublin Local Authorities engaged with technology developers to commence a project which would look at issues arising with the management of ring buoys, to ensure that ring buoys could be in position and ready to save lives if required. The scope of the project involved the development of a low-cost sensor to be provided in the ring buoy housing that would alert local authority staff when the ring buoy was tampered with or missing. The sensor is paired

with a map-based platform & mobile phone The playspace was designed and installed by app which provides real time monitoring of the ring buoy status and allows staff to digitally record their weekly inspections of the ring buoys, ropes, and housing.

> Last October, the project was launched with Water Safety Ireland, the Dept of Rural and Community Development as well as 8 local authorities which included all four Dublin Local Authorities. This has resulted in over 600 ring buoys across these local authority areas being



65th Anniversary of Tidy Towns

The Tidy Towns competition has a unique place in Ireland's culture. The competition commenced in 1958 and has since become Ireland's best-known sustainable and environmental initiative. In its first year the competition received 52 entries but has grown year-on-year reaching a record of 924 entries. Right from the start, the primary focus of Tidy Towns was to encourage communities to improve their local environment and make their area a better place to live, work and visit; this creates a 'sense of place' for those living in the area.

As of January 2023, the administration of the Tidy Towns Competition and grant for South Dublin County Council, has moved to the Environmental Awareness Section.

Round 1 Seed funding (up to €2,000) went live on the 10th of March.

Round 2 Annual Program Grant is for practical projects to improve entry in the Competition and is now live. A maximum budget of €8,500 is offered.

All Tidy Towns groups were invited to attend and information webinar on 24th May, where quest speakers were Gavin Harte from Education for Sustainable Development, who spoke about Tidy Towns and Sustainable Energy Communities, Ian Jackson our new Community Climate Action Officer who gave an overview of the new climate grant. We were also lucky to have Cormac McCarthy who is a member of the very successful, competition winning Ennis Tidy

Towns group. Cormac's input was invaluable, as not only is he a member of a winning Tidy Towns group, but he is also a competition adjudicator. He gave a presentation on Community, Sustainability & Biodiversity - the cornerstones of Tidy Towns.

Grange Castle Masterplan





The vision for the Masterplan for Grange Castle West, including remaining development lands in Grange Castle is to draw on the concept of creating a collaborative business community that is well integrated with the surrounding local area. The Masterplan will guide the future development of the lands, which will support the creation of up to 12,000 jobs in one of Ireland's premier business parks.

Context

The site is zoned Enterprise and Employment, and its use will reflect this. In close proximity are the Strategic Development Zones (SDZs) at Clonburris and Adamstown, which will see a large increase in local population. The use of the site will target high employment densities to bring a corresponding increase in local job opportunities. Development should also complement the existing business park lands at Grange Castle and Grange Castle South and the masterplan includes ex-

isting available development sites in both. Their proximity offers the opportunity to tie the three parks together to form a coherent economic neighbourhood. The ongoing Masterplan for 12th Lock can provide supportive public amenities such as retail, hospitality and recreation.

Key Objectives

Diversity of employment types will be an important ingredient in the success of the business park and will help to create a resilient local economy, foster innovation, and yield enhanced networking opportunities. By providing a mix of industries and business types, the park can encourage interaction between businesses of different scales and expertise, supporting the development of emerging start-ups and SMEs. This will stimulate growth and investment, creating a vibrant business ecosystem that will contribute to the development of the wider community. The park sits within reach of 7 Third Level Institutions which provide a steady supply of talented individuals



to the local workforce.

Accessible & Serviced Sites The lands contain a new access road, integrated services, landscaped pedestrian and cycle paths, and a feature lake. A variety of fully serviced sites ranging in size are available, which will support inward investment. With a growing residential population of 48,000 people with the development of the neighbouring SDZs, the new masterplan will support public amenity and job opportunities.


Connectivity & Movement

There is extensive existing cycle and pedestrian infrastructure that links the site entrance to the train station at Adamstown, the LUAS Red Line, the adjacent SDZs, and the Grange Castle business parks to the east. The movement strategy will extend this infrastructure through the park and a link will also be made to the Grand Canal Greenway. Future public transport connections to the Adamstown and Kishoge train stations will also be pursued.

With the preparation of the masterplan, a new brand identity for the business park has also been established, which will ensure that there is a contemporary look and feel to the business park from a marketing perspective, as the masterplan is being delivered. The future has never been brighter for Grange Castle and the Council looks forward to supporting the creation of up to 12,000 jobs in the County.

As Corkagh Park is a historic landscape, careful attention will be paid where the works involve excavations. Some archaeological works were recently completed as part of the enabling works for the Corkagh Park masterplan. Archaeological investigations are required to avoid impacting on anything that might remain under the ground. Care has been taken to ensure that all proposed elements respond to and work in harmony with the strong cultural heritage found in the park.

Contracts signed for €5 Million investment in Corkagh Park

Corkagh Park is a 120 Ha site that is of historical and cultural significance to Clondalkin locally. The existing park boasts a wealth of facilities such as football pitches, a newly redeveloped playground, baseball pitches, cricket facilities and purpose-built road cycling track.

These changes seek to address the visitor experience in the park in terms of improving legibility and wayfinding as well as enhancing the park's offering as a local and re-

gional destination.


A new centre 'hub-zone' of the park that serves as a destination has been identified. It will be well-linked to car parks and other components adding to the sense of place for local and regional visitors.

The works will deliver additional welcome improvements to this highly popular park and will include:


